Toronto, Oct. 14.—The foregoing appointments in connection with the reorganization and consolidation of the Provincial police force more which the Geo-

ganization and consolidation of the Provincial police force, upon which the Government has been engaged for some time, were officially announced yesterday. In making the announcement, Hon. J. J. Foy, the Attorney-General, said it was the desire to install some systematic method in the administration of justice throughout the Province, operated from a central and judicial authority.

"At present," the Minister said, "the member for the riding undertakes to say when a policeman is necessary. This is neither right nor wise, and it is proposed to put the work on a business-like basis. At the present time the department is deluged with applications for policemen. The new force will dework for all the departments of Government. The members will co-operate in the enforcement of the license and game laws."

Inspector J. E. Rogers, the new head of the force, was appointed to the service of the Province by Sir Oliver Mowat, the then Attorney-General and Premier, in 1884. He was a retired captain of the 35th battalion. During his long period of service he has dealt with many big cases and is deemed an expert on extradition. Among the celebrated cases of which he had charge were the conviction of "Clutch" Donohue, international crook, at Fort Erie; the capture of the Sarnia dynamiters: the Day murder at Niagara; the Smith's Falls and Melancthon fire bugs; the Brighton and Lambton counterfeiters, and the Tilbury murder. He has also been instrumental in securing acts for licensing and controlling circuses, prohibiting gambling on fair grounds, regulating travelling shows, the enforcement of the act respecting Provincial coroners at fire incurents. specting Provincial coroners at fire in-quests, the act respecting moving picture shows, and private detectives, and inaushows, and private detectives, and inaugurating the system of raiding tramps throughout the Province. Mr. Rogers enters upon his new dtuies forthwith.

The organization of the new force follows in detail the lines foreshadowed some months ago. The force is subdivided into inspectors of criminal investigation, who will be the central officers for detective work; the divisional inspectors, who will have charge of all constables in their respective divisions, and the constables will be uniformed. All the officers will be salaried and be on duty at all times. No member of the force will be permitted to accept any fees from cases upon which they are engaged.

FOR MISSIONS. Appropriations Made by Methodist

Board. Ottawa, Oct. 13 .- The Methodist General Mission Board concluded this afternoon the business of the annual afternoon the business of the annual meeting. The appropriation for the ensuing year, as finally agreed upon, total \$634,100, divided as follows: Home Missions, \$246,003; Indian Missions, \$113,904; Chinese work in British Columbia, \$4.915; Japanese work in British Columbia, \$3,769; missions in Japan, \$58,465; missions in China, \$123,918; Young People's Missions, \$13,907; miscellaneous, \$69,-219.

The board decided to send fifteen additional missionaries to China in 1910, and to defray the expenses of the delegates to be sent to the coming International Missionary Conference at Edinburgh.

TO MARINERS. Obstacles in Western Entrance to

Toronto Harbor. Toronto, Oct. 14.—Skippers of small craft entering Toronto harbor after dark by the new western channel are warned by the new western channel are warned to keep clear of the western end of the south pier, which extends about 700 feet from the sandbar and which is protected by a white light. This channel, being under construction, is not open for navigation and skippers using it do so at their own risk. There are some obstructions in this channel, and it is safer to use the old Queen's wharf channel, particularly at night time, closely observing the range lights.
