George Fuster Pearce, Australian Minister of Defence, has issued a return showing that enlistments in Australia from the beginning of the war to April 30th, 1917, numbered 32,000, being fourteen per cent of the male population of the Commonwealth. The same proportion for Canada would mean 560,000, instead of the 425,000 who have enlisted in this country.




