Calgary, Alberta. — The No. 4 Royalite well (Imperial), continues to amaze geologists. Its naptha production increased July to 546,135 gallons, 73 degrees Beaume, an increase of 25 barrels daily.over the June production. The production continues to increase and the flow of gas at 20,000,000 cubic feet a day is

being maintained. This flow will shortly be harnessed to supply Calgary.
