**The Evening Chit-Chat**

A gift—wedding, Christmas or any other kind—that shows no thought or individuality, seems to say, "I must give something. I don't want to bother to think about it and so I have just gotten this to cover the law."

And what a lot of that kind of gift every wedding calls out. And how comparatively few of the other kind that are the result of real thoughtfulness and real attempts on the part of the donors to put themselves in the recipients' place and imagine what they would like best.

I visited one of the June brides in her new home the other day.

In her dining room cabinet she had thirty-nine pieces of cut glass. Eleven of them were bon bon dishes. She also had several dozen odd pieces of silver of many of which she confessed she did not know the use.

Her walls on the other hand were almost bare. There had been but four pictures among her wedding gifts. A china pitcher pressed into service to hold the roses I brought her, showed her lack of vases or flower bowls. There was but one clock in the house and the only lamp was one she had just bought.

There are so many things, both expensive and inexpensive, that would just fit into niches in the new household, and make the bride bless you every time she used or looked at them, that it is simply incomprehensible to me that so many people seem unable to think of anything except the conventional little things of which there are sure to be a surplus.

Pictures, for instance, are a splendid gift and one that is next to impossible for a bride to have too many of.

"But I am not a good judge of pic-

tures and I don't know just what to get," protests someone.

I anticipated that protest, having made it in times past myself. My artistic friend has furnished me with a list of several that are thoroughly safe and desirable.

"The Hanging of the Crane" heads the list, of course. I know a man who gave over a dozen copies of that to different brides of his acquaintance and he used to say he was afraid to get married for fear they would retaliate in kind and he would have to furnish his home with the "Hanging of the Crane."

The Madonnas are always beautiful pictures to give. The Sistine Madonna, the Madonna of the Chair, and the Madonna of the Arbour are particularly beautiful ones. Sir Gala had, any of the Corot or Inness landscapes. Millet's "Angelus" or "The Sowers." "The Death of the First Born," a magnificent animal picture are all prints that you would be safe in giving to the most exacting.

Flower vases and bowls are another beautiful, eminently desirable gift. A tall crystal vase, a quaint Japanese jar, or a bowl of some of the new potteries would not represent very much expense and would mean a good deal of utility and beauty.

Nice linen is always acceptable—a fine tablecloth and a dozen napkins to match was one of the most thoroughly appreciated gifts that one of the June brides I know of received and I am glad to notice that fine linen and even inexpensive blankets and sheets are beginning to appear on many of the bride's gift tables.

A carving set, a sewing tray, a pair of brass candlesticks, a half dozen frappe glasses, a fern dish with a fern in it, a good thermometer—would no any of these and a dozen more little niche fillers make a more acceptable gift and one more personal and individualized than a conventional bit of silver or cut glass or any similar bric-a-brac?

**HOUSEHOLD NOTES.**

Rubbing the hands over with a cut tomato once a day will not only remove all stains, but will serve to whiten the hands as well.

A soft rag moistened with lemon juice and then dipped in silver whitening will be found excellent for cleaning piano keys.

To keep the soreness out of a painful soft corn, try binding it up each night with baking soda, moistened with a little water.

A thick paste of litharge and glycerine will stop up holes and cracks in tinware. It should be allowed to stand a week before using.

It will save time if a frying pan or griddle is wiped with a piece of old newspaper to remove the surplus grease before it is washed.

A spoonful of sugar added to the water for basting meat, will give it a rich brown color, and the flavor will be much improved.

If your soup is found too salty, add a few slices of raw potatoes, and cook a little longer. The potato will absorb the surplus salt.

To kill fleas on a pet dog, if the animal is small, place it in a small bathtub of water and comb the hair with a fine comb; water drowns these pests.

Place a heavy and deep skillet over the irons, and be surprised how much hotter the irons will get and how much longer they will retain their heat.

If seams are pressed over a broomstick or any rounded edge with care in keeping them straight, there will be no shining streak to mark their length.

A large bunch of sweet clover in a closed room will drive flies away when the room is opened later. A few drops of lavender will serve the same purpose.

To clean plaster of paris figures and plaques, make a strong solution of scleratus in water, stand the figure in and dash the water over it, touching every crevice.

When a large bottle of olives is opened and part of them used, pour about two tablespoonfuls of olive oil upon the brim to prevent the rest from becoming soft.

To test tea, burn a small quantity on a metal plate. With good tea the
