The Delhi Durbar.

In spite of doubt and criticism from some quarters His Majesty King George V. is bent on giving outward and visible show to the spirit of Imperialism which has always animated him. Of all his predecessors, he is the one who is pre-eminently the King of the Dominions and Dependencies beyond the Seas. His naval training before he became heir to the Throne, his extensive travels afterwards, and particularly his voyage as Duke of Cornwall to the Dominions of the Empire, have given a personal acquaintance with the features and characteristics of the British Empire, such as no other King on the Throne has had the benefit of. After the accession of Edward the Peacekeeper, a Coronation Durbar was held at Delhi, but King Edward was not present. In a few weeks another Coronation Durbar will be held at Delhi and His Majesty the King and Her Majesty the Queen will grace the high function with their presence, which will be made grander, more solemn and majestic by the coronation of the King as Emperor and the Queen as Empress of India, the latter title being bestowed on Victoria the Good some 30 years ago, during the administration of Lord Beaconsfield. The selection of Delhi for these functions is due to its historic importance. It was once the seat of the Buddhist religion and culture, and in the Twelfth Century became the capital of the Mogul Empire. It has therefore associated with it the pomp and power of Empire in India, and its fall in the Sepoy Mutiny of 1857 was the effective beginning of the bright era of British Government rule in India.

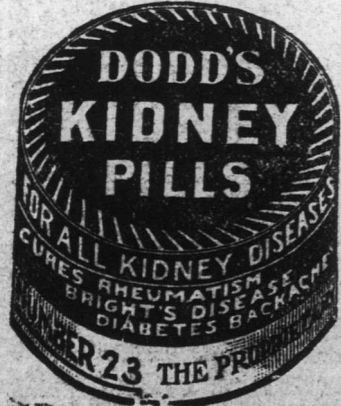

Canon White, in the presence of many friends of the happy couple. The groom was assisted by Rev. W. Clarkson and the Bride by Miss Isabel Willis. After the ceremony a reception was held at Smithville, where about 60 friends of the newly wedded pair were present and at its conclusion the bridal party drove to Donovans where the bride and groom remain until Saturday, after which they return to the city by train for a short while and will then proceed to their future home at Burgo. Both received very many pretty and valuable presents. The Telegram extends heartiest felicitations.

A wedding took place on Tuesday last, the 2nd inst., on board the s.s. The Brilliant Here.

H. M. S. Brilliant arrived here at 6 a.m. to-day from Little Bay after successfully towing off the Clyde in just 5 minutes after her lines were put on board. She left here at 9 a.m. Monday and got down at 5 Monday morning averaging 14 knots on the run. The ship sails for England the latter part of the week. The Clyde is now on her route having suffered no damage and Capt. Delaney has gone along in her.

Fire at Charlton St.

A fire broke out in the house of Mr. Rose, 24 Charlton St., last night, caused by a lighted kerosene lamp catching the ceiling. Mr. Whitten who lives upstairs in the tenement, smelled the smoke and not finding any fire in his own flat, aroused Mr. Rose. The fire had by this time burned right through the ceiling. A few buckets of water thrown on the fire put it out.
