Electricity for Bonavista.

We understand that a private company has been formed for the purpose of lighting the town of Bonavita by electricity, and that already most of the capital for the work has been raised. Messrs. Otto Emerson and J. W. Morris, of the Reid Nfd. Co. recently returned from Bonavista after being over the ground, and their services had been loaned to the promoters of the scheme by the Reid Nfd. Co. The power to supply the electric fluid will be generated by the waters of one of the large lakes near the town, and the initial work will begin when the summer opens. An up-to-date service will be appointed for the lighting of streets and churches, halls and residences, and we learn it is possible that the service may be extended to Catalina and other places in Trinity Bay.

One issue the Plaindealer is supporting the fishermen, and in another it is supporting the Government. It puts me in mind of what we fishermen call a cat's paw. That is little puffs of wind flitting about on the water. The Plaindealer says it can easily understand now why Coaker flooded the northern outports with petitions for a general election in 1912, stating that if the people have to wait until 1913, that the time will be too long to keep his game covered up and that every man with two eyes and two ears and a brain matter enough under his skull to think at all will have found it out by that time. On the contrary, the people will see more clearly that the present Government is increasing the public debt very largely, and the Government will stink more pungently in their nostrils.

PRICE OF COAL

Dear Sir,—The high price for coal just now seems to me to be strange, because the coal dealer does not pay any more than \$2.50 at the mine. It's run of mine, sticks, chips, splint bath or stone, call it what you like, but there is plenty of dirt in it. It does not go through the screens or on the picking belts. It's just as it comes from the pit. You can get a genuine cargo from the wash plant, screened, picked and washed, for \$3.25. Now \$2.50—say \$2.50; freight, \$1.50; duty, 50c.; landing, 30c.; the whole thing \$4.80 per ton. Now, Mr. Editor, how in the name of common sense can the poor coal dealer live selling it for \$7.00 per ton? Wake up for once Laborers' Union. Get in your own coat for the Union. Demand from the Government a landing place and get rich quick; \$2.20 and \$2.40 is a very good make on coal. I would say a lot more, Mr. Editor, but I don't want to trespass on your valuable space.
