Special Evening Telegram.

ELIZABETH, N. J., To-day.
Three men met death in the air on a high tension wire. For more than an hour their smoking bodies remained swaying above the street until they were removed by firemen.

MOOSEJAW, Sask., To-day.
A railway wreck occurred at Corona near Pigeon Lake. The operator forgot to deliver an order, and a freight and a passenger train collided. Two engineers, two firemen and two brakemen were killed and a dozen passengers injured.

PEKING, To-day.
The City Tshuan, Province Shantung, is in the hands of 2,000 banner-men who mutinied last evening and have been burning, looting, shooting throughout the night. No foreigners so far known are injured. The Government has taken refuge in the Catholic Mission Station. Banner-men complain fear of disbandment and non-payment wages.

LONDON, To-day.
Outside of London the strike movement amongst the transport workers is gradually dissipating. Bristol is the only port that has been completely tied up. The strike committee ordered men to resume work and similar orders are expected from strike leaders in Manchester and Swansea and probably by Monday work at all ports will be proceeding normally.

LONDON, To-day.
The strike continues, but owing to distress of the families of those who are out workmen are anxious to resume. The strike leaders are seeking to effect a compromise with employers at best terms obtainable. It is expected, however, peace will eventually come through the Government's offer to refer dispute to industrial Council.

NEW YORK, To-day.
More than 250,000 leading business men throughout the States, including 120 commercial bodies, which organized the National Tariff Commission and Association will present a demand for both Republican and Democratic National Conventions for incorporation in the planks of their respective platforms, an endorsement of the principle of a scientific tariff through the medium of a permanent commission.

NEW YORK, To-day.
Yesterday Roosevelt said he was going to Chicago in response to the unanimous demand of Roosevelt delegates, will reach Chicago on Saturday. Will Roosevelt go to National Convention? was asked Senator Dixon. Roosevelt's campaign manager, "I do not believe Manager McKinley. If Taft campaign, will give Roosevelt a ticket and I am sure the Sergeant at Arms would not admit him without one," said the Senator. Roosevelt's manager smiled as he spoke. It was subsequently learned that Roosevelt is expected to remain in Chicago until the close of the convention, that he plans to appear in Convention Hall and may be given an opportunity to address the convention on his own behalf. Such a development is unprecedented and undoubtedly would furnish material for a sensational demonstration in Chicago. Up to last night the committee labors resulted as follows:—Total contestants decided, 186; for Taft, 173; for Roosevelt, 13; remaining undecided, 68.
