### Meeting of Licensing Board.

The Licensing Board held their annual meeting yesterday afternoon to consider applications for renewals of licenses. The meeting took place in the magistrate's court, Mayor Ellis presiding. Judge Conroy and Mr. Knight were present as well as Inspector General Sullivan and Mr. Blackwood.

A petition was read by the Chairman protesting against the renewal of a license to Mr. Albert O'Reilly. The petition was largely signed, both by private citizens and over fifty of the Reid Company employees. The Inspector General of Police raised objection to the continuance of Mrs. Kelly's license because the premises, which is situated on Rawlin's Cross, is an important residential section. Objection was also raised by Rev. Mr. Fenwick to Mr. James Haw's license being renewed. The reverend gentleman contended that the location was dangerous to persons leaving the premises because of street cars passing near.

Inspector General Sullivan objected also to Thos. Wall's license considering that he does business on two premises connected with one another by a doorway and that the law only permits one place to be used. Mr. Coady made application for a wholesale license. This matter will be considered Monday.

The meeting adjourned at 4.30 p.m. and it was later decided in committee to continue at 3 p.m. Monday when those to whom objection was made as to continuation of their license will be called for further examination. Before the meeting closed it was decided to continue Jas. Haw's license and all other applications were favorably reported on except Kelly's, O'Reilly's, Wall's and Coady's, and these will be finally dealt with on Monday.

WASHINGTON, To-day.—The Customs Court has granted the Government's application for an indefinite postponement of the Wood Pulp and Paper case, involving the right of European countries, under the most favoured nation clause of the Treaty with the States, to send into this country wood, pulp and paper, free of duty. That privilege is now granted only to Canada under the Reciprocity Act. The issue will thus be stayed for several months.
