Heavy Damages for man who lives with broken Neck.

New York, Nov. 4.—What is declared to be the largest verdict awarded under the Employers' Liability Act in this city was brought in by a Supreme Court jury yesterday, in favor of Fred C. Neun, who lives with a broken neck.

The jury directed the Harris H. Ivis Iron Works to pay Neun \$25,000. Neun, an iron worker, had his neck dislocated when he fell ten stories while at work on a downtown skyscraper last March.

Wearing a steel brace around his head and extending down his spine to hold his neck in place, Neun appeared in court as his own witness. His physician testified that any sudden shock, even a sneeze, is likely to result in Neun's death.

Neun is 28 years old and has a wife and three children. He was an athlete before he was hurt.

Threw Pepper at Premier Asquith.

London, November 3.—There was a suffragette battle on Saturday, when a band of four women attacked Premier Asquith as he was motoring from Stirling to unveil a statue to Sir Henry Campbell Bannerman.

The women, who were lined up across the road, forced the car to stop. One of them threw pepper on the occupants of the vehicle while another attempted to strike the Premier with a dog whip.

The assault was ended by the arrival of police detectives who were following in another car. Four women were arrested.

The Premier was besprinkled with pepper, but betrayed no uneasiness. His daughter, Violet Asquith and Lady Graham, who were with him, were greatly alarmed, however.

This is the second time the Premier has been attacked with dog whips.

Cable News.

LONDON, Nov. 9. The British steamer South Point, from London, Oct. 28th, to Philadelphia, which was reported damaged in a collision off Gravesend, became disabled 700 miles west of Queens-town, and was picked up by the s.s. Rappahannock from Halifax, October 30th, for London, and towed into Queenstown.

LINLITHGOW, Nov. 9. The Linlithgow bye-election resulted in the return of Pratt, Liberal, over Kidd, Unionist, by 521 majority. At last election the Liberal majority was 2,070. The vacancy was caused by the elevation of the Rt. Hon. Alexander Ure to the Bench. Kidd was the Unionist candidate at the general election.

CONCORD, Nov. 9. Governor Faiker has honored the requisition of the State of New York for the extradition of Harry K. Thaw. The case is now transferred to the Federal Courts, where a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Thaw is now pending. The Governor based his decision on the indictment returned against Thaw in New York County which charged him with conspiring to escape from the insane asylum at Mattewan.

LONDON, Nov. 9.

The C.P.R. Liner Montcalm, on arrival at Avonmouth to-day, reports having encountered severe weather in mid-ocean, as a result of which derrick was broken and one of the life-boats lost. The falling derrick came in contact with several boxes of phosphorus, the contents igniting and only by the quickness of the men in throwing the burning matter overboard and jettisoning what boxes remained, was the ship's cargo saved. Some men received slight burns, but the ship was almost undamaged.

MONTREAL, Nov. 9.

Has Canada's new island disappeared beneath the waves with suddenness equal to that with which it emerged? This question is prominent by the report made by Capt. Danstrup, commander of the Danish steamer Taysland, which has arrived from Demarara. It will be recalled that after the appearance of the island was first reported, the Hudson Bay Company's steamer Acadia located it for the Dominion Government, as being about thirty miles north-east of Sable Island. Capt. Maskett, commander of the Lines Serrana, which sailed from this port yesterday, believed she must have passed close to the new sand island. He found only 20 fathoms of water when sounding, where, according to his chart, there should be 60. Danstrup reported following the Serrana from Demarara in approximately the same course. He sailed right over the location accorded by the Acadia to the new island. Supposing the reports made by the Acadia and Taysland to be both correct, then the only assumption that seems possible is that the island must have suddenly disappeared after the passing of the Serrana, and before the coming of the Taysland, as otherwise the Danish steamer must have been wrecked.

Madrid.

Author of "At Good Old Slivash." Madrid, the capital of Spain and the center of the guitar, cigarette and bull fighting industries of the world, is situated in the geographical center of Spain, 2,500 feet above sea level, in a heavy draught.

Madrid is noted in literature for its lovers, and among tourists for its climate. The lovers average 123 in the shade as they stand before the barred windows of the Madrid debutantes and sigh, but the climate is more sickle. It varies from 123 in the shade to freezing, and it can accomplish both in the same day. The prevailing Madrid costume in summer is a thin suit, a fan, a heavy woolen blanket and a straw hat.

Madrid is not as old as most European cities. Before the 16th century it was only a way station, and wasn't even in a Class D bull fighting league. In 1560 it was made capital of Spain, however, and grew rapidly. It now contains 600,000 people, several of whom do not smoke cigarettes.

Madrid has one of the largest palaces in the world, and a handsome new railway station. It has more fine paintings than New York and more churches than Chicago, but has to get along without roof gardens or Chinese restaurants. It has a university with 5,000 students, but it is a tame affair, not having broken a collar bone or burned a building since the seventeenth century. Madrid has 72 public squares, all completely filled at all times with gentlemen of leisure, including a large number of statues of deceased kings. Madrid has one fine street, two miles long, and a number of street cars, each equipped with fenders in the rear, to protect pedestrians.

Madrid does most of the manufacturing for Spain and is a growing town, about the size of Cleveland, Ohio. In general liveliness it resembles the latter city after 1 a.m. The principal amusements in Madrid are sleeping in the afternoon, promenading in the evening and betting on which precedent the King of Spain will break next. It resembles an American city in only one thing—the street cleaning department seems to require about the same amount of rest.

Expelled for Making Money.

New York, Nov. 6.—James Steele, Jr., once editor of the Eagle, Little Falls, N.J., whom Canada deported yesterday, declared he was expelled because he made too much money. He said fellow employees on a Halifax paper learning he was earning more than they, protested to the immigration authorities that he had come to Canada under contract. His employers were fined \$200.

Raid Opium on Kendal Castle.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 6.—Customs inspectors pressed a gang of stevedores into service as an attacking party in a raid for opium on the British tramp steamer Kendal Castle yesterday. The steamer's Chinese crew had resisted the inspectors' entrance but surrendered when the stevedores joined in the attack. The officials seized a large quantity of the drug, charging that it was being smuggled into this port from Montreal.
