Mining Activities.

(Western Star.)
An option has been taken on the Hill Cove mining property by W. H. Bennett of New York. Mr. Bennett is president of a large mining syndicate of the United States. His son is now at Hill Cove together with an engineer going over the property. We learn that a 600 h.p. concentrator is to be installed there this spring; and should results warrant it, one of a 1000 h.p. capacity will be installed later.

Col. J. H. E. Riley, the active partner of a company owning mineral claims adjoining the York Hr. mine at Blomidon, and other parties interested in the property are due to arrive here July or August, to inspect the prospects of a profitable development.

The Natural Resources Department of the Reid Mfg. Co. will have four parties operating on the various claims of the Company the coming year.

House of Assembly.

(Yesterday.)
The House met at 8.15.
Petitions were presented by Hon. Mr. Crobie and Messrs. Stone and Abbott.

The House went into Committee on the Business Profits and Income Tax Resolutions and passed same. With respect to the former it is proposed to make the Act effective for the year 1919, it having expired on 31st Dec. last, also that taxes be paid on the premiums collected by Fire Insurance Companies, not on their profits. The Minister stated that \$94,000.00 has been paid in Insurance premiums last year, but only about \$6,000.00 had been paid as taxes, as some 60 Companies claimed they had not made the necessary profits. The latter bill proposes to tax the absentee landlord on incomes derived from rents collected in Newfoundland. It also enables taxes to be collected from people residing in this Colony and who have investments abroad, irrespective of the fact that they may be taxed in the country where the investment is.

Mr. Currie thought that in some way both Insurance Companies and Landlords should not be allowed to increase their premiums and rents so that the burden would fall on the insured or tenant.

The resolutions passed the Committee and Bills were read a first time. The following Bills were introduced and read a first time:

An Act to provide for the Inspection of Food on Sealing Steamers.
An Act to Amend Act 6, George V, 1915, Chapter 28, entitled "An Act Respecting the Refining of Cod Liver Oil."
An Act to Amend Act 6, Geo. V, Cap. 18, entitled "An Act Respecting the Administration of Local Affairs."

Mr. Currie asked the following question:—
To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if the Railway Contractor has, in accordance with the terms of the Railway Act, 1901, under which the Branch Railways are being operated, furnished him with the weekly traffic returns of the Branch Railways as provided by section 22 of said Act, and in accordance with the form contained in Schedule F to the said Act, and if the law has been complied with, to lay a copy of those weekly returns, for the period since the Branch lines have been in operation, upon the table of the House. Also, to ask the Hon. Col. Secretary if the contractor has made default in forwarding such returns whether the penalty provided by sub-section 5 of section 21 of the Newfoundland Railway Act, 1901, has been or will be enforced against the Railway Contractor. Also, to ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if such default shall have been made by the Contractor, to exercise the power vested in him under sub-section 4 of section 21 of the Newfoundland Railway Act, 1901, to supply to this House the particulars asked for in my question of date the 30th ultimo.

The Colonial Secretary replied that the matter was being looked up.

The Weights and Measures Bill was read a third time and sent to the Legislative Council.

The Bill to give power to raise revenue by duties on ships entering Grand Bank for improvement of the Harbor, was read a second time.

A message from the Legislative Council announced that His Excellency requested the attendance of the members for the purpose of assenting to the Loan Bill.

The House then adjourned until this afternoon.

Shipping Notes.

The schooner Loha Argenia, owned by D. J. Burke, of St. Jacques, will shortly begin loading codfish for Gloucester from the Gordon-Brew Co.

The schooner Colofia which left here with a cargo of codfish, has arrived at Gibraltar.

The S. S. Digby, Capt. Chambers, left Liverpool on the 2nd, inst., and is due at this port tomorrow.

The S. S. Wren, Capt. Geo. Barbour, has been chartered by the Government for light-house service. After she has completed that work, she will take up the Northern Labrador Service.

The Meigle leaves North Sydney today for this port, with general cargo for the Reid Mfd. Co.

The S. S. Glencoe arrived at Port aux Basques at 8 p. m. yesterday and leaves again today coming down the coast.

The S. S. Petrel, which left here on Wednesday morning to take up the mail passenger service in Trinity Bay, arrived at Clarendville 1.15 p. m. yesterday.

Very Painful Accident.

While returning from his farm on the White Hills, Mr. William Hennesbury, accompanied by his son, met with a very painful accident, when his horse took fright and bolted, crushing him against a fence, hurting him considerably, and which might have proved fatal but for the timely assistance of his son, who extricated him from his perilous position. The horse was stopped in his mad career by ex-Sergeant Gulliver with the assistance of his father and brother, who conveyed the injured man to his home at King's Bridge. He was later attended by Dr. Macpherson who ordered him to hospital, where he is now doing as well as can be expected.

Household Notes.

Honey is not only cheaper than sugar, but it is actually better in some kinds of cooking.

Two parts of pork fat to one of beef fat form an excellent mixture in which to fry doughnuts.

A scratch on polished furniture can be almost obliterated by rubbing vigorously with linned oil.

Biscuit dough with more than the usual amount of shortening makes excellent shortcake.

When packing a trunk for travelling, have a case of different colored cloth for each kind of garment.

A table of weights and measures, typewritten and framed under glass, should be hung in every kitchen.

Allow two level teaspoonfuls of baking powder to each cup of flour when no eggs are used.

Allow from four to six eggs to each quart of milk in making a custard to be turned from the mold.

To take disagreeable medicine, eat one or two cloves or hold ice in the mouth until the tongue is chilled.

Before wearing your rubbers rub them well with vaseline. Let them remain a few days before wearing them.

Wash colored silks in cold water and a moderate amount of soap. Do not rub the soap directly on the fabric.

When hanging pictures, hang facing the wall, then turn over. This crosses the wire and prevents slipping.

Go to the refrigerator every morning, take account of the left overs, and plan the menu accordingly.

Do not wait until afternoon to plan the evening dinner. Haste makes wasteful marketing and poor meals.

When you desire almond flavoring for cake or blanc mange use a few fresh peach leaves.

Serve crushed strawberries with honey ice cream made with milk, cream, cornstarch and honey.
