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

What was required was co-operation among the people if the housing situation was to

be improved. Hon. Mr. Whiteway in discussing the Bill said there were many landlords in the city who had not increased their rents since 1914, and some protection should be afforded this type of laudlord, and at the same time something should be done to better the conditions of the poor in respec

to housing. Hon. Mr. Grieve did not agree with the principle of the Bill at all. It should never have been introduced, and should not be allowed to go to

the Lower House.
