British Directors Deny all Knowledge Of Besco Enquiry

United States Prelates Receive the Red Hat—British Premiers Anxious to End Controversy with Italy—100 Dead in Amalfi Disaster.

SEEKING TO REMOVE OLD GRIEVANCES.

LONDON, March 27. Premier MacDonald told the House of Commons to-day of his desire for a settlement of the difficulty with Italy over the East African region of Fubland. "No one shares the friendship of Italy more than I do," he declared, "and if I could only manage to get this long drawn controversy ended I should be a very happy man. I am hopeful that before long these outstanding grievances will be removed and that the old historic relations between Italy and ourselves will be restored."

ABSENTEE DIRECTORS.

LONDON, March 27. The Daily Herald, the Labor organ, to-day published a statement made by a solicitor acting for Lord Furness, Director of the British Empire Steel Corporation. The statement is to the effect that the English directors of the British Empire Steel Corporation, of which the Dominion Steel Corporation is a subsidiary, represent the advisory board in London, and they are absentee directors with relation

to Nova Scotia and are in no way associated with the direct management of the Dominion Steel Corporation. The Board of the British Empire Steel Corporation in London, the statement says, had no knowledge of the circumstances connected with the investigation by the Royal Commission, of charges against Sir Richard Squires, former Premier of Newfoundland, of accepting presents of large amounts of money from the Dominion Iron and Steel Corporation until the Enquiry was commenced and has received no information on the matter since except that contained in the press. To-day's statement in the Herald followed a request by the paper in a previous issue that the directors in England of the British Empire Steel Corporation should state their position with regard to the Newfoundland revelations.

VICTIMS NUMBER 100.

SALERNO, March 27. The extent of the calamity in Amalfi and vicinity continued to grow to-day, it being estimated that the number of victims of the landslide along the shore would be at least 100.

MUTINEERS SURRENDER AMMUNITIONS.

DUBLIN, March 27. It is officially announced that further large quantities of ammunition have been surrendered to the Free State authorities, including six Lewis guns, 76 rifles, 70 bombs and nearly six thousand rounds of ammunition, from County Tipperary. Other surrenders are expected from Tipperary, when only those seized in County Roscommon will remain in possession of the army mutineers.

WANTS ANOTHER CONFERENCE. WASHINGTON, March 27. Senator Borah, Republican, Idaho,

offered a joint solution in the Senate to-day requesting the President to invoke such nations as he deems wise to send representatives to a combined economic and disarmament Conference in Washington.

MAKING A THIRD ATTEMPT.

DARJELLING, British India, March 27.—The third expedition for the conquest of Mount Everest, the highest peak in the world, started from this place yesterday under the leadership of Brigadier General Charles G. Bruce, who headed the 1922 expedition.

OFF FOR ROME.

LYONS, France, March 27. Stuart McLaren, British aviator, took off for Rome on the second stage of the round the world flight at 11.30 a.m.

RECEIVED THE RED HAT.

ROME, March 27. Pope Pius to-day publicly conferred the Red Hat on Cardinals Hayes and Mundelein, the final act in the elevation of two United States Prelates to membership in the Sacred

College. The ceremony was performed in the right transept of St. Peter's and was carried out with all the pomp and pagantry of the Roman Catholic Church.

ANOTHER TRIAL IN SEPTEMBER.

MONTREAL, March 27. The retrial of Rev. J. Adelard Desjardins, on a charge of having murdered his half brother Raoul, will take place in Montreal at the September term of the Court of Kings Bench, authoritative sources declared to-day.

SCANDINAVIAN IMMIGRANTS FOR CANADA.

PORT ARTHUR, March 27. Immigrants from Scandinavian countries numbering nearly 17,000, will arrive in Canada this year, according to H. Peterson, Secretary of the Scandinavian-American Line, who arrived here to-day from Copenhagen, Denmark. Mr. Peterson says about 10,000 Finns, 3,000 Danes, 2,000 Norwegians, and 3,000 Swedes will arrive shortly.

A Voice from the People

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir.—Your stirring editorials of the past few days should be an inspiration to all who love their native land—to all who have any regard for common honesty and decency of public life.

With such a clean cut exposition of conditions before us there can be no excuse for any failure on our part to realize the necessity for drastic measures on the part of our responsible Executives, and for cool, sane judgment on the part of the people. It will be a great pity if we allow ourselves to be sidetracked in any direction by self-seeking demagogues. We are now at the parting of the ways, one road leads to clean government "of the people, by the people, for the people," the other leads back to the same old den of thieves, swept and garnished for the new tenants. This is no time for Old Liberals or Hide-bound Tories to wave the red flag of party-feeling or personal animosity; we must be prepared to act with the cold impartiality of the presiding judge.

We, the people, are the last court of appeal; public opinion must pronounce the final judgment on all unjust stewards of the people's estate.

We must be on our guard against any form of emotional propaganda. We must not stand aside in silent indifference; nor must we allow ourselves to be swayed by any hysterical outbursts of political rage. The professional politician has no party but his pocket, no principles but the privilege of grab, and he knows from experience that the people forget, that the public, for the most part careless and indifferent, stand aside, too busy with its own affairs, to concern itself with the great questions which affect it so closely; but the man who wants something never forgets—never gets tired—he warns himself while his neighbour is burning. Now is the time to watch the men who find their opportunities in our necessities.

We should approach this great crisis in our national life with malice towards none, with charity to all; but the inflexible determination to "let justice be done, though the Heavens fall."

"No easy hopes or lies Shall bring us to our goal, But with iron sacrifices of mind and will and soul. There is but one task for all—For each one thought to give, Who stands if Justice fall? Who dies if Error live?"

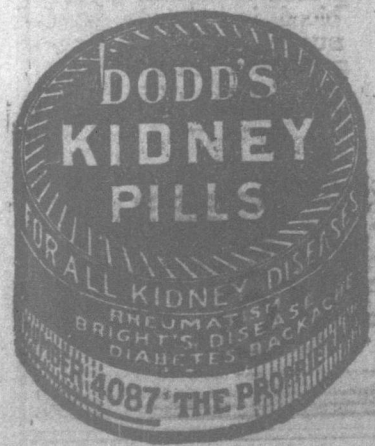
