For more than two years the Discovery will be chasing whales, and will endeavour to track hem no matter where they go.

The Discovery is at present in drydock at Portsmouth. She has been feeling the effects of her hardships in the frozen seas, and they have left their marks on her timbers.

She had developed dry rot in some portions, it has been difficult work to replace the havoc. Wooden vessels of her type are not common to-day, and timber of a suitable size and strength has been hard to obtain. Most of the work, however, has been completed, and it is anticipated that she will be ready in a few weeks.

To the Great Ice Barrier.
