It is indeed a difficult matter to try to put into words the public want, for the contents of the women's page on a daily newspaper, like subject matter, is discussed on the subject of the women's page, but little definite was decided. Some people are of the opinion that the women's page should deal only with news; others prefer a touch of poetry, some wish no pink tea, but plenty of women's meetings, while their sisters cry out for a full description of table decorations and a proper advertisement of the women's page.

Some would have absolutely no questions of the heart answered, while many troubled women were telling the society editor what to help the "Loveknott" column is to them. Receipts for favorite dishes are the receipt of some, and the delight of others, and fashion cuts are at once

a bore and a blessing to feminine readers. Beauty hints are, in demand, also questions relating to health, and management of the home, while many think that women are sufficiently advanced in politics to merit a column on woman's suffrage. CHARGE AGAINST VICARY'S DAIRY IS DISMISSED

The charge against Vicary brothers, dairymen, of selling impure milk as food especially prepared for babies, was dismissed by Magistrate Sanders yesterday.

The action was brought by the medical health officer, to whom a bottle of this milk containing a large quantity of foreign matter had been brought by a customer two hours after its delivery.

Mr. Vicary declared that every care was taken in handling this milk from one cow maintained solely for the purpose of supplying food for infants, and invited inspection of any bottle of milk from the wagons.

His Worship decided that the case was an exception, owing to an accident of some sort, which should not cast a reflection on the general quality of Sprucevale milk, and dismissed the case.
