same in volume as it was in 1873-4, under a 15 per cent. tariff, and it has not increased in eighteen years. It has varied from year to year according to the character of our crop. When that was bountiful it went up, when poor down. But there have been only two stages since 1873-4 when the foreign trade has been as great as in those years, i.e., in 1882-3 and 1890-1.

How does this compare with the rest of America? The foreign trade of the United States since 1870 has increased from \$913, 000,000 to \$1,613,000,000, or 75 per cent.; Mexico has increased \$23,000,000,000,000 as per cent.; Central America 39 per cent.; the West Indies \$95,000,000, or 34 per cent. The South American countries show an increase of \$396,405,645, or 90 per cent. How is it that we alone are stagnant? The Free Press accounts for the greater increase of population in the United States by saying that they have a dozen Ontarios and we only one.

Then why is it that their Ontarios in crease many times as fast in population as ours? Let us see: Ontario has increased 186,000 in ten years. In the same period

The Great English Newspapers on the Ottawa Scandal.

Men Guilty of or Aiding and Abetting in Public Plunder Should Be Driven From Power.

The leading newspapers in Great Britain,

have condemned in the strongest terms the wholesale corruption that was laid bare at Ottawa during the last Parliamentary ses. sion. They have also condemned the ercokedness exposed at Quebec. For the plundering of the people of Canada, to the extent, we believe, of millions of dollars, the men in power at Ottawa must be held responsible, and the people of the Dominion, by their votes, must punish them. As for the boodling in Quebec, the punishment of those guilty of wrongdoing must be left to the people of that Province, just as in Ontario the Provincial Government, when put on trial, must be condemned or indorsed by the people of this Province by their votes

at the polls.

Seeing this is the state of affairs, it will do no harm, and may effect much good, to reflect upon the views of the great English papers after studying the disgraceful ex-posures at Ottawa, which, by the way, will have to be resumed when the House reassembles this month.
