FAIR WEATHER.
Toronto, Ont., March 10-11 p. m.—The depression over the Middle Mississippi Valley yesterday is now over the South Atlantic States. The pressure is increasing in Eastern Canada, and higher pressure from the Northwest is spreading over the lakes. The weather is fair and cold everywhere, excepting in Alberta, where it is turning decidedly milder.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 12-40; Battleford, 12-16; Qu'Appelle, 14 below-12; Winnipeg, 4 below-10; Parry Sound, 8 below-24; Toronto, 12-25; Ottawa, 2 below-14; Montreal, 4-16; Quebec, 2 below-12; Halifax, 16-32.

MISSING VESSELS.
Two Large Seining Vessels and a Steamer Long Overdue.
Port Townsend, Wash., March 11.—General alarm is felt for the safety of two vessels, one bound to and one from Puget Sound. The Hawaiian bark *Mauna Ala*, Capt. Wm. Smith, which sailed from this port Nov. 9, laden with a cargo of lumber valued at \$6,000, is long overdue at Port Adelaide, Australia.

The other vessel is the British bark *Xantippe*, Capt. McDonald, now out from San Jose de Guatemala 124 days, a passage generally made in 70 days.

San Francisco, March 11.—No news yet of the overdue steamer *Rio de Janeiro*. She is now out 33 days from San Francisco for Yokohama. This is the longest passage across the Pacific in many years. The Pacific Mail people state that the steamer is no doubt drifting about the ocean with her machinery disabled, or that her coal supply has run short.

Down to Business.
Annual Meeting of the W. A. M. A.—
Large Gathering of Delegates
—The Association's Membership—Officers.

The ninth annual meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary Missionary Association of the Diocese of Huron was opened in Cronyn Hall at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

The board of management met on Monday evening and discussed a resolution by Mrs. Lenfesty, of Stratford, asking for a larger representation of the branches at the association meetings. One delegate to every ten members was asked, but the board refused, as it was claimed that such representation would be prejudicial to the interests of the smaller branches. It was further decided that Huron's contribution to the salary of the lady missionary at Union Lake should be taken from the undesignated thank offerings, some \$9 having been already subscribed.

At noon yesterday the board held a short session, after which luncheon was served by the London ladies. The first general business session was commenced at 2:30 in the afternoon, the following branches being represented, several by the full complement of delegates: Aymer, Beachville, Bradford, Brantford, Burford, Chatham, Clarendonville, Delaware, Durham, Forest, Galt, Guelph, Ingersoll, Haysville, Lambeth, Lucan, Middleton, Mitchell, Milton, Millbank, Munceytown, Oshwehen, Petrolia, Port Dover, Port Rowan, Port Hurwell, Preston, Princeton, Sarnia, Shelburne, St. Thomas, Stratford, Strathroy, Thornhill, Tyrone, Walkerton, Walkerville, Watford, Warwick, Weesbeach, Wilmet, Woodstock, and Wardsville. The numerous London branches were strongly represented, and nearly all the members of the board of management were present.

Letters of greeting were read from the diocesan auxiliaries of Ontario, Montreal and Niagara, the provincial board of management, and Miss Cross, Miss Wilson, Miss Young, Miss Montgomerie and Miss Watson.

The recording secretary reported seven new branches organized during the past year. The total membership of the association as far as can be learned (for some branches have failed to report), was 1,594 seniors and 1,275 juniors.

The corresponding secretary spoke of many urgent appeals from the mission field, and pleaded in behalf of Zonana work.

The Dorcas secretary reported many boxes sent out in the year, and the treasurer's report was the best presented in the history of the association. The reports of the various committees were equally satisfactory.

The president, Mrs. Baldwin, followed with an address of welcome and a review of the work of the past auxiliary year. A touching allusion was made to the martyrdom of Rev. E. and Mrs. Stewart, who met death in China, and also to the suffering among the Christians in Armenia.

A vote of thanks was tendered the retiring diocesan officers. The recording secretary, Miss Haskett, and the corresponding secretary, Mrs. Falls, were re-elected by acclamation.

Mrs. (Rev.) C. B. Sage was elected treasurer, and Miss Gower as Dorcas secretary.

The delegates appointed to the triennial conference of the Dominion Association were Mrs. (Rev.) Canon Richardson, Mrs. Tilley and Mrs. (Rev.) E. N. English, of this city.
