Good-Bye to Camp Life.

The First Section of Volunteers Return to Their Homes.

Presentations to Favorite Officers—A Lively Night on the Hill—Reveille and the March Out.

Last night was a somewhat noisy one in camp. No sooner had the men returned to quarters from the fair grounds than the fun began, and it was kept up until early morning. There was no harm, but joked and laughed as they stood outside a tent shrouded in darkness and heard within the sonorous snore of a heavy sleeper. A moment later there would be an explosion; then the mischief-makers dispersed through the darkness leaving the sleeper, who had been so rudely awakened, to utter anything but blessings on the wretches who had disturbed him. Huge firecrackers were discharged all over the camp, and it was a common thing to see one volunteer "tapping" for another with a club or tent mallet.

The piquets were turned out, after a string of twelve firecrackers had been thrown into Dr. Roomer's tent. Officers and men, in their bare feet, and clad only in a sleeping gown, were a common sight. Strange to say, even where the guard went, they found the funny fellows fast asleep, or else they had just awakened by the loud report from Surgeon-General Roomer's tent.

About 4 o'clock the camp was quiet, the piquets on duty being then too numerous to allow any pranks to be played.

At reveille, everything was astir, and packing up began in earnest. Delivery wagons, loaded with furniture and boxes, soon lined the streets from camp to depots. The general opinion of officers and citizens is that this has been the most orderly camp London has ever known.

All the blankets issued to the corps were folded and handed over to the camp quartermaster at 7:30. The tents were left in remarkably clean condition, with curtains down and the pegs piled up inside.

The battalions left for home according to the orders issued yesterday, as follows:

Thirty-second, Bruce—No. 2 company, Kincaid, No. 3, Lucknow and No. 8, Teeswater, left East London station at 7:45. No. 1 company, Port Egin, No. 4, Port Egin, left the same depot at 7:45. No. 7 company, Strathroy, at 8:20, and No. 8, Hilderton, at 7:45 a.m.

The Twenty-seventh, Clair-Borders, consisting of several companies from Petrolia, Forest, Widder, Wyoming, Point Edward, and Sarnia, all left via G. T. R., at 8:30 a.m.

The Field Battery and "D" School are the only ones left in London on Monday morning. The Twenty-eighth, Perth Battalion, Twenty-ninth, Warrenton Battalion, and Thirty-third, Huron Battalion, will arrive and occupy the deserted tents. The Field Battery will go out of camp next Friday, and then only the infantry will be left.

While High Constable Cogan, of Champlain, was the accompanying officer, the Twenty-second, Bruce Battalion, was surrounded by his men in the afternoon and made the recipient of a handsome sword.

Lieut. Armstrong is young, both in years and in command, and though a thorough disciplinarian, is endowed with a gentleness and affability that has made him a great favorite with his men. Lieut. Armstrong replied, briefly thanking the men for their kind appreciation. He was, however, ready, he said, to do for his comrades all that lay in his power, and wished to make no distinction between the soldier and the soldier's wife in a soldier's way.

Capt. Henderson, of No. 5 company, Walkerton, Thirty-second, Bruce, was the next to be waited upon by his company, who, after rendering him a worded address, presented him with a beautiful white service, as a token of their respect and appreciation of his many kindnesses.

Capt. George Macbeth, No. 5 company, Twenty-sixth Battalion, is perhaps the best known young officer in camp. He was summoned to the company's line, and presented with a handsome gold-headed cane and the following address:

To Capt. Macbeth, commanding officer of No. 5 company, Twenty-sixth Light Infantry, Middlesex.

We have assembled here this evening desiring to express our appreciation of your many kindnesses and the high regard in which we hold you. During our sojourn in camp, and we ask of you to accept this cane, not for its intrinsic value, but as a slight token of our esteem and also as a memento of our gracious sovereign Queen Victoria.

We also hope that our relations to each other may be as pleasant in the future as in the past, and also that heaven's blessings may rest upon you and yours.

Signed on behalf of the men and non-commissioned officers, No. 5 company, Middlesex Light Infantry, with bassador, Sir Henry Drummond-Wolf presiding. Mr. Hannis Taylor, the American minister, was the only invited guest. Mr. Taylor, in the course of the evening, eloquently eulogized the virtues of the Queen and expressed the respect and love in which she is held by all English-speaking people.

Ironwood, Mich., June 25.—Frank Hodge, aged 14, and Albert Peters, aged 11, both of this city, were drowned in the Montreal river, west of Hurley, Wednesday night.

Bay City, Mich., June 25.—Miss Minnie M. Lewis, a stenographer, fell from the boat in which she and Fred J. Lanfear, of the Bay City Tribune office, were rowing, Wednesday night. In attempting to rescue her, Lanfear capsized the boat. Both held on tight, but were slowly drifting out to sea when the wind veered. After seven hours of almost hopeless despair, they were rescued by Winona Beach rescuers. They were nearly dead.
