Dr. Bethune, Scaforth, Dr. Bell, Montreal, and Dr. Lapthorn Smith, of Montreal, and Dr. Lapthorn Smith, of Montreal, took part in the talk. The latter drew attention to the fact that displaced kidney was hardly ever to be found among males, while it was commonly found among the females. "I had my attention drawn to this fact." said Dr. Smith, "when one night I heard some young men passing my window from their club and discussing a society belle. One said, 'Well, I can't for the life of me see where she keeps her 30 yards of intestines.' (Laughter.) They were wrong in their figures; they meant 30 feet. I wish Dr. Eccles had had time in his excellent address to speak of the ounce of prevention as well as the peund of oure. Is speak of the compression of woman's waist by means of corsets. While we cannot probably effect the abolition of the corset, we might all use our influence in the modification of that garment. The corset might be worn a little looser, a little less tight or a little larger.

The patient was also present, and the point of the abdominal incision was examined by the physicians present. Dr. Ferguson was con-

"The anatomical relations of a large malignant growth in the neck with a secondary deposit in the lung" was the title of a well-written paper by a young physician, R. Primrose, of Toronto, who was highly commended for his able effort.

The chairman, Dr. Cameron, of Toronto, called upon Dr. Meck, of London, to repore an operation performed by the latter that morning. Dr. Meek responded and exhibited a huge growth which had been cut from the abdominal regions of the patient, a woman. Dr. Cameron, one of the mosa eminent surgeous in Canada, approved the skill and apparent ease with which Dr. Meek performed the operation, though differing from him in diagnozis of the case. Dr. Eccles said he had also winessed the achievement and was facilined to agree with Dr. Meek as to the sausation.

The first business of the final session was the submission of a lengthy report on behalf of a previously nominated committee by Dr. Praegar, of British Columbia, which epitomized, recommended the adoption of some scheme by which a physician of one Province might practice in any other Province through the agency and authority of a Dominion Medical Examining Board—a supreme organization for Canada. The -a supreme organization for Canada. The report also suggested the advisability of establishing this same co-operation between

establishing this same co-operation between England and Canada.

Dr. A. B. McCallum, of Toronto, said they could not hope to see accomplished in their generation any such result as set forth in the motion. Medical practice came under Provincial jurisdiction. There were some universities which did not give medical degrees. So long as in Quebec there was such a difference of views existing as to the character of a currentum. there was such a difference of views existing as to the character of a curriculum, so
long would the present anomaly in Quebec
exist. By this motion they would give the
privilege of conferring degrees on Laval
and other French-Canadian universities
while withholding it from some in Ontario.

send representatives to this association
and, if possible, agree upon some united
plan of action.

Dr. Wesley Mills, of Montreal, one of Quebec's leading physicians, followed with an interesting and unique paper on "Peculiar Forms of Sleep or Allied Conditions." The doctor said he had secured a hibernating ground hog and had watched its habits carefully for four years. He had also paid attention to several peculiar cases of human lethargy and cited the instance of a man named "Sleepy Joe" who would lay in an comatose condition with brief intermissions to respond to nature's calls, during several months of the year and awake in the latter part of the spring active and vigorous, and also of an old woman who was bedridden and in a like state for thirteen years, during which she only spoke twice. The learned doctor held that the cases of the animal and the human being were analogous and ware could! we yidences of the hibernatanimal and the human being were analogous and were equally evidences of the hibernat-

and were equally evidences of the internating principle.

Dr. McCallum, physiologist, of Toronto University, said it did not follow because a person slept long in the day, or for a month or year, that it was a case of hibernation. He did not know that he would accept Dr. Mills' theory that the cases cited were analogous. Dr. Mills defended his position. The

symptoms were analogous, and as he was an evolutionist it seemed to him the cases were phases of the same hibernating ten-dencies.

The report of the nominating committee was presented.
