Literally a "Going Concern"—What Kruger Tells for Publication—His Burghers Will Not Surrender While 500 Armed Men Remain in the Country-At Laing's Nek Both Sides Are Passive—Warning Against a Premature Rush of Workmen to the Transvaal.

London, Friday, June 8-3 a.m.—The Marquez, dated yesterday, Lord Rob-executive officers of the Transvaal Govexecutive officers of the Transvaal Gov-Station. President Kruger caused the interior of the coach be reconstructed some time ago, with view to contingencies that have now arrived. A correspondent of the Daily Express who went from Lorenzo Marquez to see President Kruger, was received yesterday. The president sat smoking a long pipe. He looked worried, but his bearing was quiet and determined. He did not make the least objection to being interviewed. The correspondent was equipped for the interview by telegrams from London.

"Yes," said President Kruger, "it is quite true that the British have occupied Pretoria. This, however, does not end the war. The burghers are fully determined to fight to the last. They will never surrender so long as 500 armed men remain in the country. I feel deeply encouraged by the fine work Steyn and Dewet are doing in the Free State."

The correspondent who secured the interview telegraphed it direct from Machadorp Station yesterday, when the wires were working as usual to Lorenzo Marquez. The Daily Express in commenting

upon the interview, refers to the unabated defiance of the chief of the Transvaalers.
Telegrams from the British side are exceedingly scanty. Two brief ones, received from Pretoria, say that Mrs. Kruger is still occupying the presidency, and that a number of engines and cars have been secured.

THE BRITISH PRISONERS Nine hundred British prisoners ar-

trains full leaving the vicinity of Pretoria. Mr. Prevost Battersby, in a dispatch to the Morning Post from Pretoria, dated June 5, says the Boers pledged themselves to twenty British officers not to take the British prisoners away if these officers would con-trol them and prevent an outbreak. Nevertheless, they began their remov-al. After 900 had been taken, British shells struck a train that was loading and the Boers desisted and retired. The British officers at Daasport refused to leave their quarters, and made the Boer commandant a prisoner, releasing him at midnight on condition that he would cancel the order for the removal of the prisoners. The Pretoria forts were found without guns. All the ar-

tillery had been gotten away. Another dispatch says: Sixteen hundred British prisoners were removed. After the government had taken away most of the stores, the burghers were given a free hand to help themselves. All the British found was a few hundred bags of coffee and sugar. MANY BOERS KILLED.

The British under Major Delisle captured a machine gun and caused the Boers heavy loss, the British casualties being slight. Boer officials removed £300,000 in gold

from the National Bank on June 4, but did not touch the cash holdings of the other banks. Some of the Boers are surrendering voluntarily, and the townspeople of Pretoria are described as showing con-

siderable enthusiasm over the British arrival. THE CAPTURED YEOMANRY. Four Irish judges had sons in the battalion of the 13th Yeomanry which was captured at Lindley. Mr. A. M. Porter, son of the Right Hon. Andrew Marshall Porter, the Frish master of the rolls, was killed, and Mr. W. H. Holmes, son of the Right Hon. Hugh Holmes, lord justice of appeals, was

severely wounded.

The list of casualties now coming through indicates that there was severe fighting before the 13th Yeomanry surrendered. Already the names of 19 men killed and 23 wounded have issued. The killed include Sir John Elliott Cecil Power, Bart., and among the wounded is the Earl of Longford.
