Nothing at All Satisfactory

Can Be Learned Regarding the Chinese Situation.

The Latest Story Is That the Pekin Consuls Are Held as Hostages—Situation Grows Darker—Reports of Wholesale Massacres at Different Points—Official Treachery Illustrated.

New York, July 30.—The Japanese consul at Tien Tsin sent a runner on July 16 to Pekin. On the 9th the runner left Pekin, bringing a cipher telegram to the Japanese Government, says a Che Foo special to the Herald, dated July 27. It reads: "We are defending ourselves against the Chinese very well, but now the attack has stopped. We will keep up to the last of the month, although it will be no easy task."

"The Japanese casualties are: Killed—Kozima, diplomatic attaché; captain and one student, and also a few marines. Wounded—Five or six slightly wounded, very many."

The Che Foo consul says that nothing was written about the other ministers.

LI QUESTIONED.
London, July 30.—Shanghai dispatches to the Daily Telegraph say that Li Hung Chang was questioned yesterday. He declared that the emperor, empress dowager and foreign ministers are all safe. But he is unable to explain why, if the ministers are safe, he cannot produce such proofs as would satisfy the powers. He strongly favors holding the ministers as hostages so as to secure favorable terms for the emperor, dowager and the rebel government. He does not see that holding the envoys as hostages would be a less crime than killing them. It is obvious now that the object of Li Hung Chang's visit to Shanghai is to sow discord among the allies through the consuls, but as yet he has not met with much success.

A municipal meeting has been convened for Tuesday for the purpose of reorganizing the defense of Shanghai. The number of possible assailants is considerably greater than was originally supposed, and a great many officials who are apparently loyal do not deserve to be trusted.

NO PROOF OF THE ENVOYS' SAFETY.
London, Monday, July 30—4:15 a.m.—The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says he is still firmly convinced that the ministers are safe, but with the exception of an alleged message from the Japanese legation in Pekin, dated July 19, brought by a runner, saying that the legation was still defending itself, nothing has as yet been published giving anything in the nature of proof. On the other hand the daily increasing reports of the massacre of missionaries and foreigners leave only the most slender

thread on which to hang a hope. The general situation is steadily becoming darker, and a crisis is said to be fast approaching. It is rumored in Shanghai that 10,000 Chinese troops have been secretly moved into the vicinity, and that the commander of the Kiang Yu forts has been ordered to fire if any addition is made to the number of foreign ships ascending the river. Fighting has already occurred at Kiu Kang, the mobs threatening death to foreigners.

With the arrival of the second Japanese division, the allied forces at Taku and Tien Tsin will number 70,000. The river floods near Tien Tsin are diminishing. It is reported that Russians from Harbin have arrived at a point 150 miles north of Pekin, after severe fighting.

MORE MISSIONARIES MURDERED.
A special dispatch from Shanghai, dated yesterday, says that the English mission station north of Ning Po has been destroyed and twelve missionaries have been murdered.

"THE TRIADS."
The Canton correspondents of the Daily Telegraph, in a dispatch dated Saturday, says: "The Triads" have become numerous and threatening in Hai Nan. The local and the local mandarins are terror-stricken and decline to protect foreigners. All the missionaries except three have left with their wives and families. The natives of the Nodoo district of the island were so frightened that they all joined the ranks of the Triads. Serious disturbances are expected between Aug. 1 and Aug. 15, during the festival to be held to appease the shades of the dead. The Boxers are charging large sums to the Chinese for passports from Pekin to Tien Tsin. Lao Yun Fu, the Black Flag chief, has refused to march out of Pekin unless Viceroy Tak Su will furnish him with 20,000 soldiers.

ON TO PEKIN.
The Shanghai correspondent of the Times yesterday says: "I learn that Li Ping Hong and Lu Chuan Lin, governor of Kiang Su, both rabidly anti-foreign, are advancing toward Pekin with large bodies of troops. Their advent must seriously affect the situation. Today the consular body decided that the Triads demands the presence of a military force in Shanghai, and the consuls have notified their governments accordingly."

A THREAT.
The Chinese legation in Berlin has received a message from Sheng, director-general of railways and telegraphs, saying that he had received a dispatch from Pekin, announcing that Gen. Tung Fung Shih threatens to kill all the members of the legations if the international forces advance upon Pekin. Evidently the legation is embarrassed by the receipt of this dispatch, as the Chinese minister has not communicated it to the German Government.

SHOULD AS HOSTAGES.
The Shanghai correspondent of the Daily Express, telegraphing yesterday, says: "A new imperial edict, promulgated this evening, urgently orders all viceroys and provincial governors to endeavor to negotiate peace with the powers, whose ministers are held as hostages, pending the result of hostilities against China. The viceroys are also commanded to guard their territories vigilantly against attack, and to prevent by all means in their power the advance of the foreign troops, especially along the Yang Tze Kiang. The decree says that the officials will answer with their lives for any failure to execute these orders."

Commands are also given that not a single foreigner will be allowed to escape from the interior, where there are still fully 2,000 Europeans, connected with missionary work, in isolated sections. When the governor of Shan Tung communicated to the consuls the imperial decree of July 24 he omitted important passages addressed to Li Hung Chang. "It is admittedly inadvisable to kill all the ministers, but it is equally unwise to send them to Tien Tsin. It will be much wiser to keep the survivors of Pekin as hostages. You are commanded to hasten to Pekin; you are incurring imperial displeasure by delay. You have been appointed viceroy of Chi Li, because with your military experience you will successfully lead the imperial armies against the foreigners in Chi Li, which Yu Lu, the present viceroy, is unable to do, owing to his ignorance of military affairs." Li Hung Chang replied to this edict, asking to be allowed to retire on account of old age.

WHOLESALE MASSACRES.
"Sheng now admits that he has had telegrams since July 19, announcing that every foreigner in Pao Ting Fu was murdered, including 40 British, French and American missionaries, and announcing also that two French Jesuits and a thousand converts have been massacred at Kwang Ping Fu, on the borders of Shan Tung and Chi Li. A majority of the consuls favor strong measures against Sheng's duplicity."

"Local officials assert that the Italian priests, murdered in Hu Nan, were wrapped in cotton, which had been soaked in kerosene, and were slowly roasted to death. It is believed that all foreigners in Chi Li have by this time

been massacred, and the wave of massacre is spreading toward Ning Po and Hong Chow, from which point thirty English and American missionaries are endeavoring to escape in boats down the river to Kiang Su. Officials here anticipate a general uprising along the Yang Tze Kiang about Aug. 1.

ASTONISHING INTRIGUE.
An astounding intrigue has been revealed to the consuls here in the shape of a skillful attempt to get the maritime customs placed in the hands of an American missionary named Ferguson, who although he was an active ally of Sheng's in the latter's endeavors to hoodwink the world with regard to events in Pekin, was supported by the American officials in his claim to the appointment of inspector-general.

A Tokyo dispatch, dated July 28, says: "It is reported from Shanghai that the Boxers attacked the missionaries and native Christians at Pao Ting Fu on July 8. A foreign physician and 2,000 converts were massacred. The Chinese general, Li Ho Kch, is now marching on Pekin. He has ordered his troops to exterminate all Christians. Already one French priest and from 2,000 to 3,000 natives have been slaughtered."

Treachery.
TWO THOUSAND NATIVE CHRISTIANS KILLED.
London, July 30.—An excellent Chinese source reports a shocking instance of official treachery. The then governor of Shan Tung, Li Ping Ling, left a month ago for Pekin, being then imperial commissioner of the Yang Tze war junks. He was considered loyal, yet a couple of months ago, on the way to Pekin, he entered Kiu Chow and ordered the soldiers of his command to massacre the Christians. His soldiers killed 2,000 native Christians and one French priest.

HELD AS HOST GES.
London, July 30.—The latest news from the far east seems consistent with the theory that the Chinese government has the foreign ministers alive, but means to treat them as hostages, while the stories of massacre relate to other members of the foreign colony in Pekin. Chinese officialdom, it is alleged, openly speaks of the ministers as hostages, whose fate depends upon the decision of the
