LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Mrs. Fisher, relict of the late Capt. Fisher, once postmaster of Sarnia, died on Friday in that town, aged 59 years. Deceased was the stepmother of the late Charles Fisher, of London, Miss Fisher and Mrs. S. A. Macvicar, of Sarnia. She leaves two daughters.

—The remains of the late Mrs. George Moore, formerly of Port Stanley, arrived at St. Thomas from St. Louis Sunday, and were placed in the plot with those of her father, Capt. May, and her three brothers, who had gone before. Deceased was known to many Londoners.

—The induction of Rev. J. H. Courtenay in the pastorate of the Presbyterian Church, Port Stanley, will take place to-morrow. Rev. John Currie, Belmont, will preside. Rev. M. P. Talling, London, will preach; Rev. Geo. Sutherland will address the minister, and Rev. J. A. Macdonald will give the charge to the people.

—Mr. J. H. Price, of Port Stanley, well known here, while crossing the frozen surface of Kettle Creek at the Port the other day. They were pulled out in time. Bert Weld, traveler for Peterson & Co., Brantford, also broke through the ice, but crawled out.

A Division Court case was decided yesterday at Milton in favor of Fred T. Trebilcock, of this city, against C. E. White, a brewer, of the same town. White owed the plaintiff \$400, but sought to mortgage his business for \$900 in his grandmother's favor. The judgment in effect declares that Mr. Trebilcock's claim takes preference over the mortgage. Aylesworth, Toronto, and R. K. Cowan, London, for the plaintiff.
