# TO SEVERE CRITICISM

The Ladies' Advisory Board Arouse Hospital Trust.

Report That Details of Management Need Improvement.

Consensus of Opinion That the Condition of Affairs Reported Is Not Flattering to Trust.

Some matters of considerable importance came before the hospital trust at its meeting yesterday afternoon, That in which most interest was taken, which caused most discussion, was brought to the trust's notice by a letter presented by the ladies' advisory board, whose members have frequently visited Victoria Hospital, and observed that which they believed needed improvement, subsequently embodying the results of their investigations into the communication received yesterday. It stated that the ladies had lately found things anything but satisfactory. They had several complaints made to them, the most frequent being about the food, which was very unappetizing, the soup, for instance, being so greasy that the patients could not take it. The ladies wanted to know who was responsible for this, \*and also for the condition of the floors, which are not kept clean, one lady reporting them so dirty as to be unsanitary. Complaints were still being made about the clothes of both the patients and nurses becoming moldy and unfit for use after hanging in the basement. This mat-ter was brought up in the early spring, and it was then suggested that large cupboards might be made for the corners of the corridors that would answer the purpose. The ladies' board suggested that it was a mistake to allow the children in good health to occupy the children's pavilion, thereby causing annoyance to the sick children, and taking up the time of the nurses. which was otherwise required.
