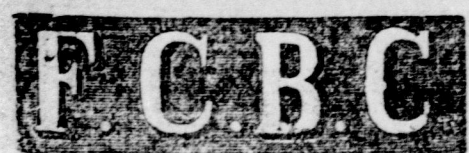

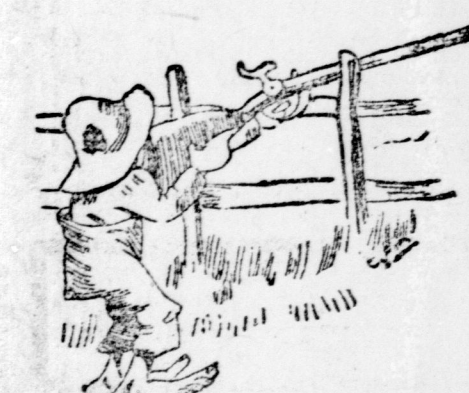

REST AND SLEEP.
To the Editor of The Advertiser:
It is interesting and instructive to
glance through the pages of an old
medical book and read the prescrip-
tions, the "book" noted not be so very
old, either, as I have no doubt the
treatment of fifteen or twenty years
ago, for a great many diseases, at
events, has been greatly altered. The
history of medicine from the time of
Galen has been one of constant change
both of treatment and remedies, and
that many people have lost faith in
medicines altogether, and declare that
they kill more people than they cure.
I think that as it may, there are no re-
medies whose efficacy has never been
doubted; the value of which as pre-
ventives or cures has constantly risen,
and are held in higher estimation
today, perhaps than at any period
of the world's history. I refer to "Rest
and Sleep."

This being the case, it seems to me
to be the plain duty of the city coun-
cil to see to it that every citizen is
protected in his enjoyment of those
two things to health and efficiency. The
chief enemy to "rest and sleep" apart
from physical conditions is "noise."
And while some noises are practically
beyond the jurisdiction of the council,
—such as necessary traffic—there are
others which the council could and
ought to control, and among those
there is none that causes more annoy-
ance to more people than the barking

CLOSE OF LIFE FILLED WITH MUCH USEFULNESS

Rev. John Lees Added Strength
to Presbyterian Ministry for
Many Years.

Rev. John Lees, who died at the resi-
dence of his son, Mr. R. C. Lees, 422
Horton street, some days ago, was
born at Galashiels, Scotland, in 1823,
and came to this country in 1834. When
7 years of age he started to work in
the woolen mills at Galashiels, and
continued at that avocation in Canada
until he had reached the age

of 30 years, at which time he began to
study for the Presbyterian ministry.
He was ordained and received his first
charge at Annapolis. He had subsequent
charges at Lucan, Westville, N. S.,
West Williams and Adelaide townships,
in Middlesex, and for some months he
lived in this city. He retired from the
ministry when he reached the age of
68 years. Rev. Mr. Lees belonged to
the old school of Presbyterian minis-
try. He left many friends to mourn
the close of a good and useful life. He
was married in 1855 to Miss Janet
Darrow, of Thessalon, who especially
caused him one year before he retired
from the ministry, and two sons sur-
vive him.

BOXERS MAKING HEADWAY

Evacuation of Shanghai Advo-
cated by Admiral Seymour.

Russia Stirring Up Trouble in Man-
churia—Children Poisoned.

Victoria, B. C., Aug. 7.—"Favored
by conditions caused by the drought
Boxers are making extraordinary
headway in Szechuen," says the
North China Daily News. "So far
and so fast that the British govern-
ment has issued a small war about
the beginning of the Chinese year."
Last month two battles took place
between the British troops and the
Boxers, the first at Tszayangshien, the
second near Anyohsen. The result in
each case was a victory for the British
troops. A dozen Boxers were killed
outright, others wounded, and later
twelve heads were exposed at two
of the cities. The British troops are
the Boxers' cause was supposed to have
been dealt a severe blow by these two
actions, and so it was, but the out-
come seemed to have been a scattering
of the seed to spring up with much
more rapidity in scores of market
towns and villages roundabout.

Twelve boys, sons of American and
European merchants and missionary
residents in China, died of ptomaine
poisoning at the China Inland Mission
school, Chi Pao, July 7. One of the
courses served to the boys and teach-
ers at the school was chicken pie.
There were several pies cooked, and
one of them was evidently bad, and
the number of boys were taken ill af-
terward, and it was thought that cholera
had broken out in the school, but the
illness turned out to be ptomaine
poisoning.

Japanese papers are republishing re-
ports to the effect that Russia is
fomenting trouble in Manchuria and
that the Chinese are being driven from
the country and that Russians are ac-
tively with the rebel interest, supplying
them with ammunition.

EVACUATION OF SHANGHAI.

London, Aug. 7.—Admiral E. H. Sey-
mour writes a letter to the London
Times strongly urging the immedi-
ate evacuation of Shanghai by the foreign
troops there. He says: "I thoroughly
agree with my esteemed friend, Vice-
roy Lu-Kun-Yi, that the time has
come for withdrawal. It is due espe-
cially to the Yang-tze. Our troops
should be withdrawn, and in my opinion
no reason that can diplomatically be
expressed demands their continued
presence there. The Chinese should at
the same time withdraw their troops.
Indeed, the keen international com-
petition in China both demands and
justifies the procedure. The French
consul here told the Chinese repre-
sentative that France was willing to
withdraw her troops from Shanghai
as soon as the other powers agreed
to take similar action. International
jealousy makes the withdrawal of the
troops highly improbable.

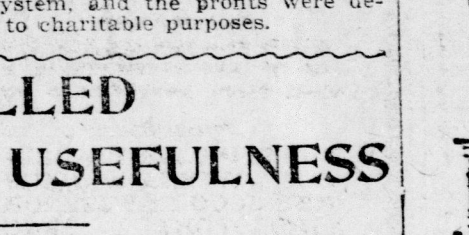

EXPERT CORRECTS ZOOLOGICAL ERRORS

Owls Neither Wise Nor Blind, and
Doves Not Peaceful.

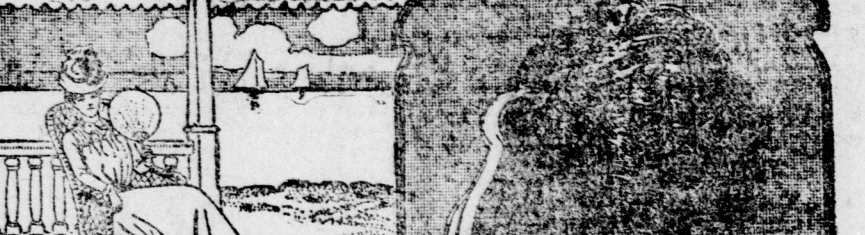
"Truth is stranger than fiction," said
C. William Beebe, curator of ornithol-
ogy, in the New York Zoological Park,
"but nevertheless many people cherish
ideas which have arisen, not only from
ignorance, but from a lack of knowl-
edge of the facts of life. One of the
most common errors is the belief that
the owl is a creature of the night,
which is a little creature that lives in
peace—peace could not exist only
after the prairie dogs had been devour-
ed by the birds and reptiles, after the
young rattlers had formed toothsome
morsels for the owls, and finally, when
the owls themselves had been swallow-
ed by full-grown snakes, those scaly
demons of the western deserts."

"Before leaving the subject of owls,
it would be well to say that these birds,
as a family, are no wiser, for all their
meditative appearance, than other
birds—in fact, they are far below
many in the scale of intelligence. An-
other false idea which many people be-
lieve concerning these birds is that
they are so confused by sunlight as to
be practically blind during the day.
Great horned owls and barn owls are
the most nocturnal of all those in the
park collection, but even these can see
very distinctly by sunlight up their
eyelids, while the snowy owls and the
burrowing owls are perfectly at home
in the light of the brightest day, and
I have seen them hunting mice and
hunting in the sunshine as unconcern-
edly as any hawk."
