

St. Thomas, Feb. 19.—One of the oldest residents of Westminster and Yarmouth, and a man held in the highest esteem and respect by all, passed away this morning in the person of William Hair. The deceased gentleman had recently returned from a visit to his son, W. A., in North Dakota, and was living with his son, George T. Hair, corner of Talbot and John streets. He had been ill only three days with peritonitis.

Mr. Hair, who was in his 73rd year, was born in Argyllshire, Scotland, and came to Canada & years ago, living since in the townships of Westminster and Yarmouth. SUDDEN DEATH OF DR. BUCKE.

The Parnell-Dean Steam Baking Superintendent of London Asylum Victim of Accident.

> Slipped and Fell on Veranda of His House and Expired Almost Instantly.

> Dr. Richard Maurice Bucke, superintendent of the London Asylum, and known all over the continent as an insanity expert, and as the lifelong friend and literary executor of Walt Whitman, died last night under particularly sad circumstances. He was about to retire for the night, and about 11:30 he walked out alone on the veranda of his residence at the asylum. A few minutes later his family heard the sound of a fall, and hurrying out, found that he had evidently slipped on a piece of ice and struck the back of his head heavily on the floor. He was lifted and carried into the house, and it was found that he displayed no signs of life. Medical aid was summoned from the asylum and from the city, Dr. Beemer and Dr. McCallum responded, but found on their arrival that life was extinct. The only mark of injury per-ceptible was a bruise on the back of

> Richard Maurice Bucke was born at Methwold, Norfolk, England, on March 18, 1837, being the son of an Episcopal clergyman, the late Horatio Walpole Bucke, and his wife Clarissa Andrews. He was brought by his parents to Canada when a year old. Educated at the London Grammar School, he after-wards studied medicine at McGill University, Montreal, and at London and Paris. After visiting California twice, he began practicing his profession at Sarnia. In 1876 he was appointed medical superintendent of the London Asylum. Dr. Bucke was regarded as being one of the highest authorities in America on the subject of mental diseases, and his opinion and services in such cases were highly valued.

In addition to being the author of a work on "Man's Moral Nature" (1879), he had written a large number of papers dealing directly or indirectly with the subject of mental evolution. His opinion was that the human mind has been slowly evolved by a species of unfolding or growth extending over millions of years. One of the most in-teresting and instructive of his papers, that on "Cosmic Consciousness," was read before the American Medico Psychological Association at Philadelphia, May 18, 1894. He last summer published a voluminous work with the same title. Other notable literary works were his publication of "In Re Walt Whitman," an appreciation of the "Good Gray Poet," published in 1883, and "Notes and Fragments," published in 1899, it being compiled and edited by him from his collection of the literary remains of Whitman. Dr. Bucke was a stunch believer in the Baconian theory, and wrote many articles in support of the contention that Shakespeare's plays were written by the great philosopher. In 1897 he was elected president of the Psychology Branch of the British Medical Association. In religion he was a member of the Church of England. He mar-ried in 1865 Miss Jessie Maria Gurd, of Moore, Ont., who survives him. The result of the union was a family of four sons and six daughters, the surviving members being Dr. E. Pardee Bucke, London; W. A. Bucke, Toron-to; Robert Bucke, a student at the Western Medical College; Mrs. Harry Pope, Strathroy, and Miss Bucke, at home. The eldest son, Maurice Bucke died in Colorado two years ago. Jul ius P. Bucke, K. C., of Sarnia, and P. Eustace Bucke, barrister of this city, are brothers of Dr. Bucke.

view Sir Wilfrid Laurier on Tuesday Mr. T. H. Smallman showed a letter from the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, asking him to use his influence with the council to persuade the aldermen to join with Toronto to secure readjustment of bonus legisla-Mayor Beck said the movement

would be a benefit to Toronto but not to smaller cities. Ald. McMechan said the change asked for was a fraud upon the small manufacturers. He gave notice that the next time a big concern in this city sought special privileges the smaller concerns were going to combine to ask for the same privileges. Mr. Smallman said he would attend the Manufacturers' Association meet-

ing and convey the committee's expression of opinion. Ald.
