London, May 4. - The British ambassador at Constantinople, Sir Nicholas R. O'Connor, yesterday presented a note to Turkey demanding the prompt withdrawal of the Turkish troops from Egyptian territory. The note is practically an ultimatum, and constitutes Great Britain's last word on the encroachment of Turkey on the Sinaitic peninsula. The French and Russian ambassadors at Constantinople are supporting the British contentions. Should the ultimatum fail to have the desired effect, the British Mediterranean fleet will take the measure so often employed by the powers in recent years, as the result of disputes with the Sultan, and a naval demonstration, it is anticipated, will quickly bring about the evacuation of the


