LOCAL MARKET.

TORONTO. Saturday, Aug. 22.—The market square was crowded to its capacity with farmers' wagons, and the hucksters were also out in large numbers. The market was well supplied with fruits and vegetables, particularly the last-named, and as a consequence sales were slow in these lines.

Grain—Wheat was higher today, as \$2.00 per bushel was paid for old oats as slow, as the one load that was offered sold at \$1.50.

Hay and Straw—A half-dozen loads of hay sold at \$1.10 and \$1.15 per ton. A load of straw was sold at \$4.50 per ton. Butter and Eggs—There was a large quantity of butter offered, but it was soon sold and prices were for cream, 25c per choice rolls, 24c to 25c per pound for choice rolls. Eggs were in fair demand at 18c per dozen for small lots, and 17c to 20c for smaller lots or the single dozen.

Vegetables and Roots—This line was the feature of the market, although there was an exceedingly large quantity offered by noon. The bulk of the stuff had been sold. Potatoes were easier at 75c to 10c per bushel, nearly all selling at 80c. Cabbages were plentiful at 40c per dozen. Onions, 80c per bushel for large ones and 70c to 80c per bushel for small ones. Cucumbers were dull at 5c to 10c per dozen for large or 20c per 100 for small. Celery, 10c per dozen. Hubbard squash \$1 to \$1.50 per dozen. Pumpkins, 15c to 10c each. Cauliflower, \$1 to \$1.50 per dozen for large ones.

Fruits—Apples were slow at 20c per bushel. Pears sold at 40c to \$1 per bushel. Peaches and plums sold at 50c per bushel. Muskmelons, 40c to 50c per dozen. The latter price for nice large ones. A few pails of elderberries sold at 70c per pail.

Poultry—There was no change in prices. Spring chickens sold at 12c per pound alive or 14c dressed, by the pair; 15c to 16c for dressed and 45c per pound by the carcass, and 3c per pound alive or 5c dressed. Ducks by the pair, were sold at 75c to \$1 dressed, or 55c to 80c alive.

Butchers' Meat—The supply was light. Beef sold at 45c to \$1 per cwt. Veal, 35c to 40c per cwt. Spring lambs, 12c to 13c per pound by the carcass and 9c per pound was paid for yearlings.

Dressed Hogs—Only a few were offered which sold at \$3 per cwt.

The price for Monday's shipment will be \$2.25 per cwt for select or \$2.15 for extra. The market is weak. Small pigs sold today at \$5 to \$7 per pair.

The Negroes Ordered Out of Town

Springfield, Aug. 21.—Six more alleged rioters have been caught in the grand jury net here. The inquisitorial body tonight returned indictments against the six persons, the documents charging twenty separate offences. All were predated upon the trouble at Loper's restaurant and were identical with those charged against Kate Howard in the indictments returned yesterday. Judge Creighton fixed the bail at \$2,000 for each indictment.

The Pacific "White Man's Ocean"

Sydney, N. S. W., Aug. 21.—The Pacific Ocean must be a "white man's ocean."

This sentiment, rife with suggestions of tremendous involvements in the Orient, has been either expressed or implied in every speech in connection with the reception to the American fleet, in nearly every expression of the Australian press and is the first subject broached when an Australian meets a Yankee officer or tourist.

That such is the feeling of the English colonists was indicated to the Americans on their visit to Auckland, but that such was the burning passion of the Australians was not revealed until this city was reached.

The extent of the demand on the part of Australia for an Anglo-American alliance to control the destinies of the Pacific and thereby the destinies of the world, the drama of which must be enacted on the Pacific has greatly surprised the Americans.

The implied support of the Australian cry by the American representatives has awakened a tremendous enthusiasm for everything American and accounts for the magnificent reception accorded the fleet.

CASTRO'S ANSWER MAY MEAN WAR

Holland Likely to Blockade Venezuela's Coast in Event of Strife.

The Hague, Aug. 21.—Holland's action against Venezuela and the text of her note to President Castro will depend largely upon the reports M. De Reus, former Dutch minister to Venezuela, who recently was expelled by President Castro, makes to the Government. He is expected to arrive here with Madame De Reus before the Government takes further steps in the matter. The ex-minister's arrival is eagerly awaited here.

The press and public of the Netherlands take the Venezuela affair most calmly. Naval officers are most interested in it and express pleasure at the possibility of seeing active service. The Government, however, thinks there is yet a chance that the difficulty may be patched up by diplomacy.

A blockade of the Venezuela coast, if it is undertaken, will not be begun for some time because the adoption of punitive measures will depend upon the tenor of President Castro's reply to Holland's representations.

Paris, Aug. 21.—Although France is watching with interest the developments of the Holland-Venezuela situation on account of her own troubles, she cannot be said authoritatively that she does not intend to mix in any way the present controversy. If the United States, as the recognized protector of Venezuela, has transferred the power of punishment to Holland, Holland is quite capable of acting and France will be a sympathetic spectator.

There is some conviction here in well informed circles that it would be unwise for Holland to land troops in Venezuela, and that the United States, if it is to maintain its position, must immediately be the signal for action, and result in the uniting of the Castros and those who oppose Castro for the defense of the country. It is believed an effective blockade would be more potent and successful.

DR. WILD INTERRED

The Noted Clergyman Buried With Masonic Rites at Toronto.

Toronto, Aug. 21.—In the Bond Street Congregational Church, of which he was the beloved pastor years ago, the remains of the late Rev. Dr. Wild lay in state from noon till 2 o'clock this afternoon.

A large number of old friends and members of his congregation filed in to the edifice and a last look at the deceased, the casket being embedded in flowers sent by Doric Masonic Lodge, of which he was chaplain, Bond Street Church, the Hebrew Benevolent Association and a number of relatives and friends.

At the church were in charge of Doric Lodge, and one of the prominent lay service was held at 2:30 this afternoon, conducted by Rev. Byron Stauffer, after which the interment took place at Mount Pleasant Cemetery. The funeral was under the auspices of Doric Lodge, the service of the order being read at the grave by Worshipful Master W. F. Bilger.

CANADIANS TURNED BACK

Had Not Money to Pay United States Head Tax.

Toronto, Aug. 21.—A party of four men, a woman and child were stopped admittance to the United States yesterday at Port Huron by American immigration officers while on board a G. T. R. harvesters excursion train en route for the wheat fields west of Winnipeg.

According to John Wellington, of this city, one of the party, they were refused admittance because they had no money to pay the head tax of \$1 apiece demanded, because they had not been residents of the Dominion for a year.

All of the men had work to go to in Manitoba, and they are indignant at the action of the officials in refusing to let them pass through the country.

HAINS TELLS OF THE CONFESSION

Slayer of W. E. Annis Relates to Lawyer Story of Troubles With His Wife.

New York, Aug. 22.—For the first time since he slew William E. Annis, Capt. Peter C. Hains, jun., has told the story of the trouble with his beautiful wife, which led up to the killing. The statement was made to Jacob A. Shay, who is associated with John F. McIntyre, as counsel for the brothers.

Before he had related more than a fraction of it disconsolately to Mr. Shay, however, the memory of the wrongs he believes he had suffered seemed to drive him into a frenzy. He sprang at his eldest brother, dropped him, and then, with a cry, he turned and tried to strike him.

Mr. Shay realized that it was useless to attempt to get any more of the story from the young captain, and abandoned the task for the time.

The encounter caused a great sensation in the jail, and evidenced the state of mind Capt. Hains is in.

Could Not Believe It. "I never had the slightest suspicion of my wife," the captain said in his story, "until about three months ago, when, in the Phillips pines, I received a warning letter from my brother. Immediately I dropped everything, and hurried back home. I could not believe the awful story was true. There must be some mistake somewhere, I thought. It is impossible Claudia could be faithless. 'Oh, God, I cannot believe it,' I kept repeating to myself.

"The month or more I knew it would take me to get home seemed like eternity. I don't believe I slept a wink in all the three long weeks in Venezuela, until about three weeks across the Pacific. I could think of nothing but Claudia and the horrible stories about her."

"To make it worse, there was not a soul on board with whom I could talk my trouble, or from whom I could obtain a shred of hope. I wandered about the deck by day and tossed in my berth by night, cursing the science that could not devise some swifter method of travel at sea."

Thought He Would Go Mad. "I tried to read, but I could not concentrate my mind on anything. Involuntarily it would turn to the subject that was racking my heart, and by every means I endeavored to forget my attention, for I felt the strain would drive me mad."

Still with all this there was something in my heart that seemed to tell me it could not be true, that as soon as I saw Claudia I would explain everything, and stamp the horrible stories the lies that they were. It could not be that the woman I loved so dearly, the mother of my children, could be the creature she was painted."

And so, between hope and hope, the young captain passed the long, weary day, and the longer nights, until he reached the United States. From the coast he sped home, and arriving in Port Hamilton, his wife denounced the awful accusations as lies.

"That night was one of the happiest in my life," he said. "I refused to speak of my brother, who had written me her lies, and I determined to show her foes that their dastardly attempts to defame my good, true woman had failed miserably."

Story Differs. "Still, it was not to be expected that I could instantly forget the maddening story. I began to go over it again, wondering how anybody on earth could be so base-minded as to have originated it."

Her absence from home she had explained by saying she had gone on a visit to the mountains. Previously she had mentioned a trip by boat. The captain could not understand how she could get to the mountains by boat and he asked her some more questions, in his horror he discovered in her replies several more points of difference between them and the story she had told him the night before.

"I wanted to discontinue questioning her, but could not," the captain more she contradicted herself. At last she broke down and confessed.

"She had not gone to the country at all, she admitted in tears, but had accompanied Annis to an apartment in the upper part of Manhattan. She thought it was an apartment of some bachelor friend of Annis."

"I thought I should lose my mind."
