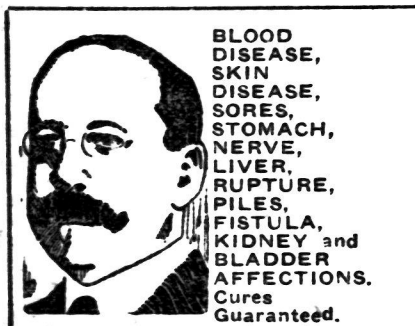

NOT SEEKING TROUBLE SAYS PRESIDENT HAYS

Declares That Grand Trunk Intends To Be Fair With Trainmen.

Toronto, July 6.—"I am not going around with a chip on my shoulder looking for trouble, and I don't think our men are either," said President C. M. Hays, of the Grand Trunk Railway, speaking in connection with the application of the company's trainmen for increased wages, at the Union station, last night.

"We may not be able to give the men all they ask," continued the president, "but I think we will be able to adjust matters so that all trouble will be prevented. We have met our men very many times, and I am going to meet them again in a few days. The men know we have always been as fair as we could, and I think they appreciate at this time that we will try to do what is fair. I am not anticipating any trouble," said he.

Mr. Hays was returning from an extended trip over the line of the Grand Trunk Pacific in the west, having gone through to the Pacific coast. His principal business, however, was in connection with the lines of the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway, speaking of which he said he had come back over the steel of that road between Edmonton and Winnipeg, finding everything in the best of condition. A through train service, passenger of freight, has been inaugurated between those two cities. Where the road cut across the country there had been plenty of rain, and the crops were in splendid condition in contrast to the more southern sections where drought and intense heat had prevailed.

Mr. E. H. Fitzgibbon, the first vice-president of the company, was also on board the train, having met the chief executive officer at Sarnia. He also was not anticipating any trouble so far as the solution of the wage issue between the men and the company was concerned. His settlement between the Canadian Pacific and their men would make no difference in their attitude, he said, because questions like the present one had to be judged on merit, and merit alone.

THE WESTERN TOUR STARTS THURSDAY

Premier and Party to Make the First Stop at Port Arthur.

Ottawa, July 5.—Sir Wilfrid Laurier, with Mr. E. M. Macdonald, M.P., and Senator William Gibson, will leave Ottawa on Thursday at noon for Port Arthur, where the first meeting of the western tour will be held on Saturday next. Hon. George F. Gahan, who went to Brockville tonight, will be in Toronto on Thursday morning, and with Mr. F. E. Pardee, M.P., will join Sir Wilfrid at North Bay on Friday. The special train, which will consist of eight or nine passenger cars, some eight or nine press representatives on board, representing Ontario, Quebec, Maritime Provinces and New York papers, leaves tomorrow afternoon for Port Arthur. From there a special train consisting of the premier's and the minister of railways' special cars and the press car, will take the party to Winnipeg and thence to the remainder of the two month itinerary.

Sir Wilfrid is looking forward with great interest to the coming tour through the west. It will be his first opportunity of seeing the western provinces, and half of the Dominion since his last western tour in 1902. The programme mapped out for the next sixty days means strenuous work for the prime minister, with little opportunity for privacy or rest, but he believes that the stimulus of the western air and the optimism and wonderful development will counterbalance the constant strain on his energies and strength.

For the past fourteen years he has had practically no real holiday or respite from the cares of state. Since the last session of Parliament closed he has been almost constantly at his post, and has taken no holidays. For the past month or so he has been also acting minister of four or five other departments of state. But notwithstanding the constant stress of his duties, Sir Wilfrid shows no signs of falling energy or health. On the western tour he will be taken to relieve him as much as possible of too insistent demands on his time, and the premier himself believes that he will return in September next in better physical condition for the work of next session, and with a better outlook on the needs of the west, from the standpoint of the leader of the Government than he ever had before.

During his absence Sir Richard Cartwright will be acting premier. The other ministers who will remain in the capital during the greater part of July and August will be Hon. Charles Murphy, Sir Frederick Borden, Hon. Mackenzie King, Hon. Mr. Brodeur and Hon. Dr. Pugsley.

According to present plans, Sir Wilfrid and party will go to Winnipeg from Fort William via the Grand Trunk Pacific and National Transcontinental Railway, thence giving Sir Wilfrid his first opportunity of seeing the new country opened up by the road which marks one of the chief achievements of his administration.

GORSIT TO STICK

Not Being Replaced Despite Speech of Mr. Roosevelt.

London, July 6.—Replying to a question in the House of Commons yesterday afternoon, Sir Edward Grey, the foreign secretary, stated that Sir Eldon Gorst would remain in Egypt as the British diplomatic agent and consul-general.

Several questions have been asked of the Government since Col. Roosevelt's Guldahl speech on Egypt as to what the Government was going to do in regard to the agent there, in view of Col. Roosevelt's statements.

Rumors have been current that Sir Eldon was to be transferred to some other post, and that Lord Kitchener would ultimately succeed to the place.

ANNOUNCE RULES FOR GREAT AIR CONTEST

Time Limit for Chicago-New York Race Fixed at Seven Days.

Chicago, July 6.—Rules and regulations to govern the proposed aerplane race from Chicago to New York were made public here today by J. C. Shaffer, publisher of the Chicago Evening Post. The Post, in conjunction with the Chicago Tribune, offers a prize of \$25,000 for the race.

The contest is to begin at Chicago on Oct. 8, with no less than three entrants who must have previous records of speed, and who must be at least 21 years of age. In case of adverse weather the start may be delayed until Oct. 15. The time limit of the race is seven days, the contestants being allowed to stop as many stops as they see fit, but the winner must complete the race within the time limit. All must start on the same day, the intervals between their taking flight to be considered in the event of a winner. Should all leave the ground at the same time the winner will be the one who first lands in New York.

Under rule 8 the possibility of some other contest of the same or greater interest being held prior to Oct. 8 is recognized. To win the prize of \$25,000 the winner must make the flight of the same or greater distance than has been adopted in any part of the country.

The contestants must pay their own expenses and assume all risks. They must be on the ground here a week before the start, giving all flights daily. They will be given a percentage of the race receipts during the trials. The start must be within the city limits of Chicago, and the finish within the corporate limits of New York City.

Czar's Police Seize Correspondent

St. Petersburg, July 5.—The Russian police today searched the lodgings of Guy Beringer, the St. Petersburg correspondent of Reuter's Telegram Company, Limited. His papers were sealed, and will be subjected to examination later.

The British consul was present during the latter part of the search. Beringer at police headquarters was examined at length regarding his relations with Baron Sternburg, correspondent of an Austrian agency, who recently was charged with communicating to Austria a report of a secret sitting of the Duma dealing with the new distribution of the Russian army. He was released.

The police are principally interested in the knowing whether Beringer, as has been alleged, furnished Sternburg with military materials submitted by the war ministry to the Duma at closed sittings. Beringer denied the allegation.

It is understood that Sternburg in his statement to the police mentioned the names of a score of acquaintances in the hope of complicating the case.

COMPANY AND MEN WORKING ON DETAILS

Conference of Trainmen and Officials Likely to Last Several Days.

Montreal, July 6.—No conclusion of the dispute between the trainmen and conductors of the Canadian Pacific and the company was reached today, but had been hoped. This was not because any further disagreement had been encountered, but because the mass of details for the settlement of the various schedules and arrangements proved too great to be handled. In fact it is stated that the conference may last a couple of days yet before the whole matter is concluded.

Mr. Leonard, O. D. McTear, Messrs. C. E. R., and Messrs. Murdoch and Berry and other members of the committee representing the men, were in session until 5:30, when they adjourned to resume tomorrow and stay on the talks until the whole matter has been closed.

On returning to the C. P. R. headquarters Mr. Leonard stated that most of the time had been taken up with discussions on the different rules and conditions of service. In order to definitely settle the terms of the agreement which is to be arrived at, the details involve a great amount of detail, said Mr. Leonard, "which naturally takes a lot of time, and it will probably be a day or two yet before they are definitely settled. The discussions, however, are going along amicably, and there is not the slightest indication at present that there will be any trouble. Each point is being taken up and settled, and a short time now should see the whole matter closed, so far as the Canadian Pacific is concerned."

ROBLIN GROWS UNEASY AS POLLING NEARS

Manitoba in Throes of a Torrid Election Campaign.

Winnipeg, July 6.—The charges and counter-charges bandied about by the candidates are still the feature of the torrid election campaign which comes to an end with the polling next Monday. The Conservative papers print affidavits to prove that Horace Clavier paid a voter in Carleton five dollars for a vote, and The Telegram caused a big lurch by publishing a cut in the identical bill. Clavier, however, right back with an affidavit from another elector who swears he was offered \$300 by a provincial police officer to make an affidavit similar to that pushed.

Premier Roblin, in speaking every afternoon and evening, jumping all over the province, and the activity of the ministers is the best indication that they are beginning to get uneasy as the result of the strong campaign of the Liberals.

Judge McDonald, of Portage la Prairie, granted an injunction, good until Thursday, restraining the returning officer for Desautels, Plains from making a return to the executive council declaring Provincial Secretary Howden elected by acclamation owing to the alleged invalidity of the nomination papers of E. L. Davis, the Liberal candidate. The case will be argued meantime. The belief grows that Mr. Howden himself was responsible for the action of the returning officer. The result is a feeling even among Conservatives, against what is termed a contemptible advantage.

LONDON THISTLES WIN AT ROYAL CITY TOURNEY

Heaman and Scott Take Matches Easily, While Asylum Rinks Fall.

Guelph, July 6.—The tournament of the Royal City Lawn Bowling Club opened here yesterday afternoon, fifty-three teams competing for the Schofield trophy.

The preliminaries and first round have been played off. Holghway, of the London Asylum, went down in the prelims, being beaten by Purcell, of Guelph, 20 to 15.

Heaman and Scott, of the London Thistles, won in the first round, and Richardson, of London Asylum, was defeated in the same series.

THE NEW JUDGES

Cabinet Council Makes Appointments Before Going West.

Ottawa, July 6.—At yesterday's concluding meeting of the cabinet council, prior to the departure of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Hon. George P. Gahan on their two months' tour of Western Canada, the three new additional judges provided for at last session of Parliament for the superior court in the three western provinces were appointed. They are Mr. Robert E. Greenhields, K.C., of Montreal, and Judge Demers, of Sherbrooke, who is transferred to Montreal.

Mr. Arthur Globensky, K.C., of Montreal, legal agent of the Quebec Government, is appointed judge of the superior court at Sherbrooke, in place of Judge Demers.

Judge A. A. Cannon, now of Three Rivers, is promoted to be judge of the superior court of Quebec district. Judge Tourigny is transferred from Arthabaskville to Three Rivers, and Mr. J. Camille Foullet, K.C., of Fraserburg, is appointed judge of the superior court for the district of Arthabaskville.
