IRISH FIRM TO BUILD THE FISHERY CRUISERS

Construction of Vessels Required not Feasible in Yard of the Dominion.

Ottawa, Aug. 30. — The contract for the two new fishery protective boats for the Pacific coast is expected to be given to the Dublin Dockyard Company, of Ireland. Tenders were called for these vessels in April last. A large number of tenders were received from Great Britain and Canada, and it was found impossible to construct the vessels in Canada for the amount provided in the appropriation available. The Dublin Dockyard Company has had experience in this sort of work, having recently built a most satisfactory vessel for the Irish Fishery Protection Board. The vessels to be built for the British Columbia coast are to be an improvement on this craft, and are to be constructed in accordance with most recent practice and with the view of obtaining the most reliable and seaworthy type of vessel for the purpose. It is possible that these vessels will be used in conjunction with two smaller motor-driven craft, as such a step would considerably increase the efficiency of the protective service on the coast. The two vessels to be ordered in Ireland represent an interesting change in policy. Hitherto an effort has been made in obtaining fishery protective ships to combine the characteristics of a gunboat and a fishery protection steamer, with unsatisfactory results as regards speed and sea-going qualities. The naval service department, on taking over the task of fisheries protection, reconsidered the subject, and decided to build vessels solely for the duties they had to perform. A preliminary design was prepared by Commander Howe, the consulting naval engineer of the department. This provided for a vessel of similar character to the fishery vessels, which it is necessary to watch, so that she would not be easily recognizable when approaching poachers, and would be able to sail the sea with the fishing fleet. By adopting the design for the protective service it proved possible to obtain greater speed, increased coal capacity, ample accommodation, and excellent sea-going qualities, practically on the same tonnage as the ordinary power fishing boat, as no provision had to be made for fish cargo.

FRANK TO REMOVE FROM DANGER SPOT

Peril of Mountain at Last Recognized, Thanks to Slide and Expert Warning.

Ottawa, Aug. 30. — The town of Frank, Alberta, which lies at the base of Turtle Mountain, and which was partially wiped out by a landslide in 1903, causing the death of seventy people, has had another scare. As a result, according to word received at Ottawa, the town is preparing to move to a new site some two miles distant. The citizens of Frank have had many warnings of danger. W. R. Brock, director of geological surveys of Canada, made an investigation after the 1903 catastrophe, and reported that there was danger of a further slide. The break in the mountain grew worse, and a second commission, consisting of R. A. Daly, W. G. Miller, and George S. Rice, made a further inquiry, their report being made public this spring. This commission reported that there was a large fissure in the mountain, and there was danger of a second disaster, of far greater extent than the first, which would wipe out the whole town. The town council were warned to move, but apparently took no action. As it was a provincial matter, the Dominion Government could do no more than point out the danger. However, in the latter part of July the mountain sent down another slide, tearing up trees and throwing down boulders, which caused consternation. The slide on this occasion confined itself to the course of the old slide, and did no damage beyond smashing a few unoccupied buildings. The town council is at last bestirring itself, and word has been received that the whole town is now preparing to move to a new site, which has been selected two miles away.

CHANCE FOR THE POETS

Richard Carle Is Seeking a Lyric for His New Musical Comedy.

New York, Aug. 30. — Richard Carle, the leading comedian in "The Girl From Montmartre," now at the Criterion Theatre, has written a musical comedy. The music and comedy are all completed, but the lyrics—that is, the song words—are still unborn. Mr. Carle, believing that there are a number of undiscovered lyric writers in New York, has decided on an open competition which any poet is privileged to enter. The name of the piece is "The Wise Guy." It concerns itself with a lanky, middle-aged banker, from up-state, who allows himself to be fooled repeatedly by a number of parasites and others who seek to bunco him out of the fortune that he has acquired, but on whom he finally turns the tables. The subject of the song Mr. Carle has chosen for the compositions is the title of the piece, "The Wise Guy." He asks that three stanzas of four lines each, treating the subject comically, be submitted to him at the Criterion Theatre on or before Sept. 1. The winner will become the official appointed lyric writer for the whole play. Mr. Carle is the author and co-author of a number of plays. He wrote "Mary's Lamb," in which he starred for two seasons, and assisted in the authorship both of "The Tenderfoot," and "The Mayor of Tokio."

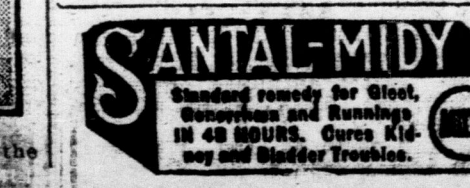

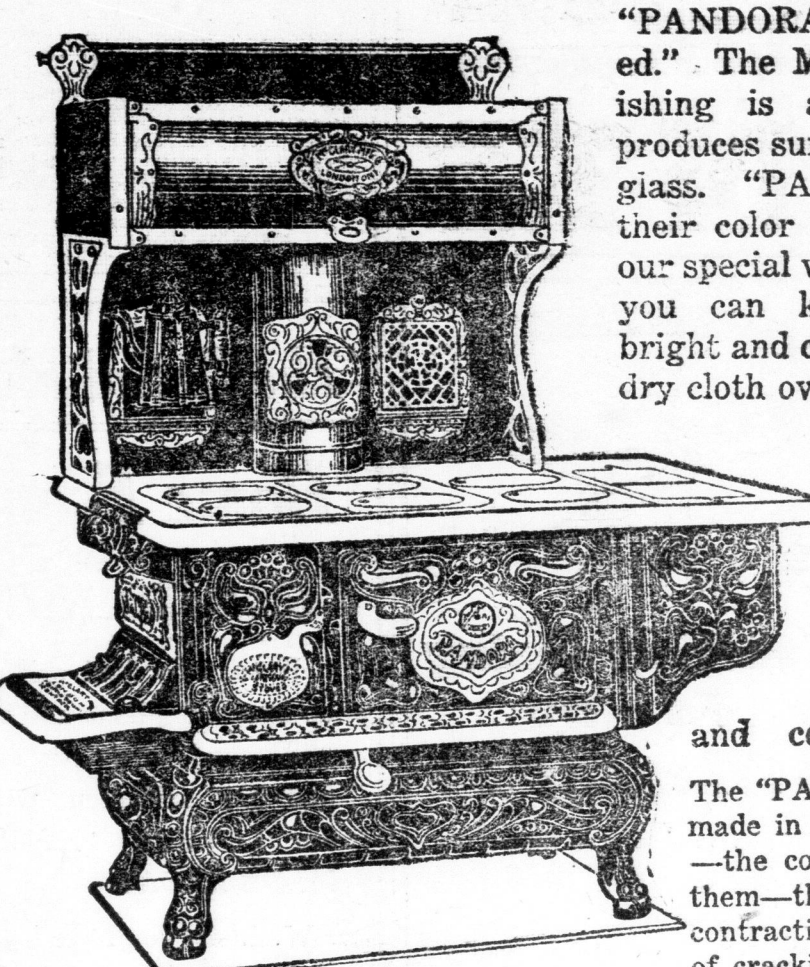

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DIRECTIONS FOR DRIVERS

Should Indicate Way They Are Going to Traffic Officers.

Although the traffic bylaw has been in force for nearly a month, many drivers of vehicles do not understand part of it. Every day in the week there is a traffic officer stationed at the corner of Dundas and Richmond streets, and on market days, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays, there is another at the corner of Richmond and King streets. These officers are placed there to control the crossing of conveyances and are responsible for all accidents that occur while they are on duty.

Many drivers remember to stop at the corners and await the signal of the officer, which allows them to cross, but as yet not many of them have learned to convey to the policeman the direction in which they wish to go. As soon as the drivers learn to do this the traffic question will be made much more simple. The drivers who do not give the direction in which they are going will be held up until all other vehicles are allowed to pass. This is only fair, as those who comply with the bylaw should not be detained by those who do not.
