Nationalists Line Has Given

ATHENS, Aug. 31.—The official silence was broken today by a communique announcing that after seven days' desperate fighting on strongly fortified heights north of the River Oheuk and Batrandji—on a line 60 kilometres in extent—the Turks have given way and have begun a retreat to the northeast. The Greeks are in close pursuit.
