Such was the jaunt undertaken Saturday last, however, by one of the world war veterans, whose name is on Secretary Ed. Lance's list at the Soldiers' Aid Commission.

This is but another instance that has come to light whereby seemingly insufficient care has been exercised by government immigration officials at the Canadian ports of entry re specting immigrants arriving here

Arriving at St. John a year ago, the Elginfield veteran, formerly of Dublin and an ex-member of Irish Fusiliers, with a good war record, including several months in a German prison camp, was sent, he related to Mr. Lance Saturday, to Toronto with his wife and child. After a brief wait he was then sent to Lucan to see the minister of the parish.

The latter provided him with two weeks' work in the cemetery, after which, upon his own initiative, he declares, he enjoyed in turn jeb the gravel pit, on the provincial highway and the brickyard. Not one he says, was any effort made by officials here to insure that he reached a farm, for which work he understood Experienced Hand.

It develops that the young Irishman is an experienced dairy hand, and his chief complaint with the government is that no person of any real authority appeared to take the slightest interest in his welfare when reached Toronto, a complete stranger in the country. During the year that he has been here he has been unable to secure that work at which he is proficient, he claims. Seeking the aid recently of the

Chamber of Commerce, he was referred to the local government employment bureau, he told Mr. Lance. At the latter office he was informed that if suitable to him, arrangements would be made for his deportation. That was a month ago.
