

thing for the province. Premier Drury said that Hon. Beniah Bowman, minister of lands and forests, was to have immediately a conference with North Ontario interests on the matter. He stated that during the last week there had been tentative proposal that the Abitibi Pulp and Paper Company be given the right to develop power on the entire Abitibi River, including the big source of power at Tin Can Rapids, and sell the power under government regulation to the user in that territory. "We have not yet considered the proposal, and do not know if it has merit or not," said the premier, adding that if nothing came of it somebody must get a lease.

Drury Promises Action. The Northern Power Company will have power into the district in June, but in the meantime the mines suffer, Mr. Lang told the House. M. M. MacBride, Brantford, said he had received a wire from the labor men at Porcupine urging that the govern-ment do something to remedy the situation.
