Booklet, Combined Novel Schedule, Score Card and Directory Will Make Hit.

The committee of management and games of the London Curling Club decided to organize along somewhat different lines this season than those hitherto followed, and are retaining only those bonspiels and games which have proven popular in years gone by, these will be operated as before. For the surpose of playing club championship games the members will be divided into two sections—A and B, and from each of these groups will be drawn twelve rinks, which will, ice permitting, play eleven games together on the dates arranged on the schedule herein. The winning rinks in each section will then play off for the club championship and the Beattie Cup. Individual prizes have also been arranged for the two leading rinks.

There will also be an innovation in the way of a bonspiel to include only leads and second players for which suitable prizes have also been arranged: this feature will be a onethe lines of our Saturday afternoon bonspiels, and will give our younger members an opportunity to show their mettle

This and other information is contained in a booklet issued by the ondon Curling Club and credited to President Charles White. It represents one of the most novel features introduced into curling in London for a long time.
