WEIR RECAPTURED AFTER DAY'S HUNT,

Jail Breaker Taken As He Is About To Enter House.

ESCAPED THURSDAY

St. Thomas, March 13.—Norman Weir, who escaped from the Elgin county jail last night, was apprehended tonight by Sergeant Ketchabaw of the local force on Kains street, when the police received information that Weir was seeking protection in a house on that street. It is reported that the would-be protector was the informant.

Since the sudden disappearance of the prisoner early last evening, the authorities have had very little clue upon which to work. The prison clothing was found at the edge of the ravine, about two blocks from the jail, and this led to the impression that the prisoner had outside aid. It was also believed that he had escaped from the city on an M. C. R. freight.

Watched Girl's House.
Sergeant Ketchabaw found trace of a London girl whom Weir had expressed a desire to wed, and who has been in and out of the city since Weir was sentenced to the reformatory. The house where she was stopping was watched, but the wanted man did not put in an appearance. Several other possible clues were followed until tonight the officer met with success, and Weir is again behind prison bars.

Norman Weir and his brother Gordon were charged with the theft of chickens. Norman was found guilty and sentenced by Magistrate Maxwell to a term of nine months to two years less a day in the reformatory. Gordon was freed on suspended sentence. Norman was held in the county jail awaiting the arrival of Provincial Bailiff Ryan, and while attending to a furnace in the jail building he managed to evade Turnkey Cline and make his escape.

One Brother Married.

The Weir brothers came into special prominence when they asked permission of the jail authorities to be married to London girls, who were held in jail on vagrancy charges. The request was not granted, but Gordon was married on Wednesday last in London to one of the girls, Violet Bowditch. The other girl, Helen Govier, is still in St. Thomas.

MRS. T. KERR, 69, DIES.

Molloy, Mrs. Daniel Blue, and Miss Annie Gillis, all of Dunwich. The funeral will be held on Monday afternoon. Interment will be made at Fairview cemetery.

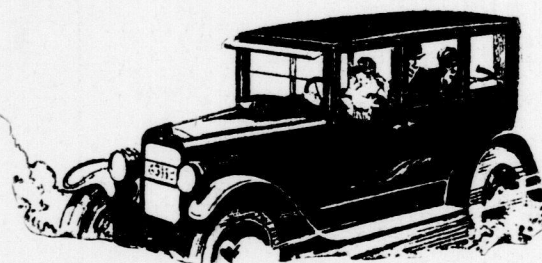
