Mrs. Mary Keller Confesses To Killing Seven-Year-Old Daughter.

SAYS TWINS KILLED

Believed To Have Also Disposed of Twin Babies Ten Years Ago. A friend recommended Milburn's H.

Special to The Advertiser Sandusky, Ohio, Nov. 13.—Belief that Mrs. Mary Keller, 47, admitted killer of Elizabeth, 7, "to save her from a life of poverty," similarly disposed of twin babies about ten years ago, was held today by Sheriff Harry L. Cole, who was submitting his prisoner to an intensive grilling.

The funeral of Elizabeth was held this afternoon from the home of Mrs. Keller's brother-in-law. Mrs. Keller attended in the custody of the

An infant's body was recovered several years ago in refuse heap in the "Big Island" district where Mrs. Keller lived, Sheriff Cole said. Police at that time did not connect her with the case, but residents there have now come forward with the assertion that twins were born to her about ten years ago. She denies that she ever had any children but the dead girl, to

whom she admits giving a dose of carbolic acid.

Mrs. Keller was also being ques-Mrs. Keller was also being questioned by the sheriff about two other unsolved deaths, one that of her father, William Betke, at Elmore, O., 20 years ago. Mrs. Keller denies all connection with this, and would


