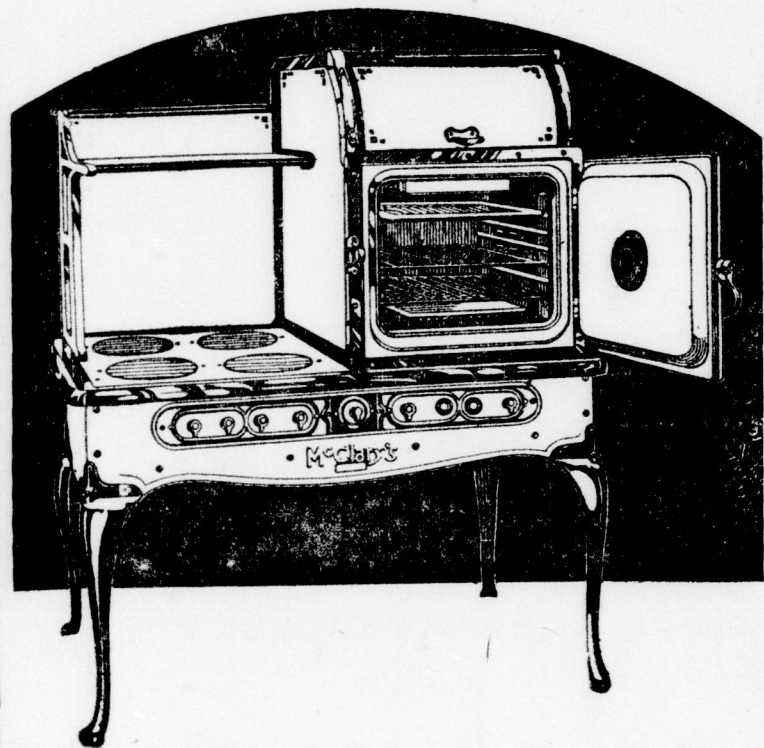

Help From Department Sought For City Schools

Trustees Decide Accommodation For Secondary Education Must Be Provided.

WILL VISIT MINISTER

The question of secondary school accommodation jumped to the fore in matters educational yesterday afternoon, when a committee was appointed to visit Toronto and consult with the minister of education and the department relative to their intentions in the matter of secondary education and the amount of assistance that could be expected in the form of a grant if the city should undertake to construct new buildings. This matter was the first one introduced at the opening meeting of No. 3 committee, when Chairman Dr. A. J. Grant brought it up in dealing with the inaugural address of the board chairman.

Dr. Grant stated that this year there was a total of 1,385 pupils enrolled in the colleges of the city, and that next year it was estimated this figure would reach at least 1,500.

Housing Problem.

"Even though we disregard the quality of the accommodation available, we still have the problem of housing these students," stated the chairman. "We are using condemned public schools as two units, and the cramming of these buildings, together with the Central Collegiate, to a point of overcrowding is causing the utmost inconvenience to the students and teachers, and undoubtedly will show up in some way or another."

Pointing out that even though a start on new buildings were made now, it would be September, 1925, before they could be finished, Dr. Grant expressed the hope that the committee and the board would present a united front in dealing with the question.

"We are legally and morally bound to supply accommodation for these students, and it is the duty of this committee to see that they get it. The citizen at large are realizing that it must be done, the parents and children know it, and a public opinion is being formed that will not be gainsaid."

Grants Important.

"Government grants are an important factor in the matter of secondary education, and owing to the accommodation we are forced to use in the east and south sections, we are annually losing portions of these grants. We must consult with the department and the minister and find out what is their mind in this matter, and also as to how to get the largest grant possible."

After the return of a delegation from Toronto, a tour of inspection must be made. On this we will take the representatives of the council, the board, the press and others. Several are not conversant with the situation, but when they know there will be a difference. The mayor has shown a willingness to co-operate, and I think when everyone knows the need that exists there will be no further doubt but that it is a real one."

Trustee Mrs. J. L. A. Hunt then moved that Chairman Bryden N. Campbell, Dr. A. J. Grant and Rev. Quintin Warner compose the committee to wait on the department and interview the minister. A request for

Buy Magazines.

The next question taken up was that of magazines at the colleges. This was left in the hands of Principal E. A. Miller, the committee feeling that he was the better qualified to deal with the matter. The books are used in the libraries and purchased through a library fund included in the estimates.

Another matter taken up was that of fees from pupils belonging to counties not contiguous to Middlesex, and it is probable that the delegation that visits Toronto will also ask for an interpretation of the departmental law in this respect.
