Toronto, Ont., December 30, 11 p. m.

of New Brunswick and Nova Scotia,
where it is comparatively mild. Mini-
mum and maximum temperatures:—Cal-
gary, 2°—24°; Battleford, 10°—2°;
Qu'Appelle, 4° below—2°; Winnipeg,
4°—8°; Parry Sound, 20°—22°;
Toronto, 18°—26°; Kingston, 18°—
28°; Montreal, 6° below—20°; Quebec,
zero—16°; Halifax, 18°—28°.
