THE THIRTY-FOUR MILLIONS of people in Great Britain, the London Times says, are better housed, clothed and fed, and have more of the luxuries of life now than at any former period of the national history.

Everybody is careful and economical, and there is less money made there is more saved than in times of inflation, when trade is advancing by leaps and bounds.

THE TWO NOBLE LORDS who succeeded from Mr. Gladstone's government because they could not approve the Irish land bill can now reflect how little they are missed. The Duke of Argyll and Lord Lansdowne may be great men in their own estimation, but their places were easily filled, and the government is not perceptibly weaker for their succession. A good authority says that the Gladstone government is stronger than the Liberal party.

THE JULIUS MURKIN, up on the line of the Canada Pacific, is looked upon as likely to furnish a goodly portion of Winnipeg's fuel supply. The peat in this muskeg is believed to be of first-rate quality, and a company has been formed to develop it. The manager of the company says that 2000 pounds of the manufactured peat are equal to 1500 pounds of the best anthracite coal for steam, heating or cooking purposes. There is a fortune in the Northwest muskies at this rate.

SIR HECTOR LANGRISH is a good cabinet minister, but his friends should not voluntarily raise a discussion on an odorous matter. It is the fact that in 1872 Sir Hector took \$32,500 of Sir Hugh Allan's money, under the terms of a bargain made by Sir Hugh and Sir George Carter; that he gave this money to use in aiding the election of his friends, and that from 1872 until now it is not known what he did with it. Whether he kept the money or spent it is immaterial; he took it for a corrupt purpose, and it remains a black stain on Sir Hector's escutcheon.

A DIRECT LINE of steamships between the United States and Brazil is likely to be established again. The Brazilian government has made a new offer to John Roach & Sons, of New York, the old contractors, which it is believed they will accept. Both Brazilians and Americans find that dependence on the English line does not pay, since freight or passengers from one country to the other must go by way of England. There has also been a considerable rise in rates since the American line stopped; on coffee, for instance, it has gone up from thirty-five to seventy cents per bag.

THE GARFIELD FUND now amounts to \$125,000, and by the terms of the subscription a "trust fund" has been created and the trust has been accepted by the United States Trust company in such a form that neither the president nor Mrs. Garfield, nor both of them, can prevent the payment of \$125,000. The interest on \$125,000 of United States registered four per cent. bonds, at least, will be subject to Mrs. Garfield's order so long as she lives. If she refuses to draw the interest it will accumulate for her children, whose rights in the fund cannot be taken away from them by any power on earth.

A CONSERVATIVE writes us a letter on the back of a circular issued by Mr. James Beay, M.P. (chairman prov. con.), asking those recipients to attend a dinner to be given by Sir Hector Langrish at the U. S. club restaurant dining-room. Mr. Beay, in the circular, says: "This is not a party dinner, but a dinner of courtesy to our citizens of Toronto to a Frenchman, the subject of a distinguished man." The correspondent asks: "When did the citizens of Toronto prefer to be invited to a dinner of courtesy to a Frenchman?" Our correspondent has not read the circular closely. Mr. Beay says "from citizens of Toronto." The absence of the article "the" from before "citizens" perhaps leaves Mr. Beay free from the charge of trying to make a political affair have a non-political appearance. If the Conservatives were to give Sir Hector a dinner they have a perfect right to do so.
