TAX REGULATIONS.
We wish to draw the attention of our readers to the notice of the Department of Customs and Inland Revenue, regarding the Luxury and Excise Taxes which will be found elsewhere in this issue.
The returns of the Luxury Tax must be made on the first and fifteenth day of each month, and the returns of the Jewellers, Manufacturers and Sale Tax must be made not later than the last day of the month following the month covered by the return. All returns are to be made to the local collector of Inland Revenue and any information desired may be obtained from him.

A BIG VESSEL.
The large four-masted schooner "Florence A. Stone," which arrived at Dalhousie on Saturday, is apparently the hardest vessel to tow that has been brought up the Restigouche for years, as after several attempts, four ordinary tugs could bring her no farther than the ballast ground, where they were compelled to leave her. The Dalhousie Lumber Co.'s powerful tug, No. 26 (Capt. Gould) towed her to Campbellton on Monday, making the town in a little over four hours, against a strong wind and tide.

LEAVING FOR TRIP TO ENGLAND.
Rev. F. E. Boothroyd left Friday evening for Quebec from which place he sails on Wednesday next on the steamship Prince Frederick William for England. Mr. Boothroyd will spend about three weeks in England and on his return to Canada will take up his parochial duties in Campbellton.
Rev. F. E. Boothroyd arrived here last Saturday morning and occupied the pulpit of the Methodist Church at both services and made very favorable impressions on the congregations at both services. He left Monday evening for Quebec, from where he sailed for England.

POTATO CROP INSURANCE.

The cheapest and most remunerative form of insurance for the potato crop is the Potatoes Bordeaux Spray. Farmers in the North Shore of New Brunswick are just beginning to get acquainted with this method of protecting their potato fields against the dreaded disease called "Blight" or Rust.

As "an ounce of prevention is worth a pound of cure," now is the time to spray, and delay will only mean a loss, because late blight will soon be baking its appearance. This disease is caused by a fungus which kills the leaves of a plant and thereby prevents its proper functioning.

Chlorophyll or the green coloring matter in the plant has the property of converting the carbon absorbed from the air in the form of carbon dioxide gas, into starch which is stored in the tubers. As soon as a plant loses its green color, the storing or manufacture of starch stops, and consequently the growth of the potato is also checked.

It is estimated that potato plants make potatoes at the rate of five to ten bushels per acre per day. These figures are estimated on a three hundred bushel crop allowing about forty days for the growth of the plant and approximately sixty days for the maturing of potatoes. The loss through blight can therefore easily be estimated if out of sixty days allowed for the maturing or growth of the tubers, the plant dies twenty or thirty days before time.

The value of Bordeaux spray as a protection against blight has been demonstrated time and time again. At the Experimental Farm in Fredericton, last year, results on potato plots were obtained as follows:—

Bushels per Acre.	Marketable Bore Small Total
Sprayed with Bordeaux 398	14 412
Untreated 221	77 321

The total cost of spraying was in the vicinity of \$20. per acre; and, as the figures show, the time and money was well spent since the increase in yield was 117 bushels of marketable potatoes.

Many similar results have been obtained in different parts of the province and in other countries.

The average increase obtained during ten years by the use of Bordeaux spray at the New York Experimental Station was 97 1/2 bushels to the acre and 113 bushels at the Main Experimental Station. Surely then spraying is a good investment if it can bring an extra hundred bushels per acre at a cost of approximately twenty cents per bushel.

Preparing Bordeaux Mixture.
The materials required for Bordeaux are: 4 lbs. Blue stone (Copper Sulphate), 4 lbs. Stone lime, freshly slaked, or Hydrated lime, 40 gallons of water.

This mixture is called 4-4-40 Bordeaux and is prepared as follows: Take a wooden container, pour in it four gallons of water, dissolve in it the four lbs. of Blue stone by putting the crystals in a bag and hanging it near the top surface of the water. When the bluestone is completely dissolved and this will take from 10 to 20 hours, the four gallons of bluestone solution can be poured into a barrel, and 66 gallons of water added to it, thus making a 20 gallon solution containing 4 lbs. Bluestone.

The same is done with the lime. Slake four lbs. of Stone lime in four gallons of water, strain through a
