While not a few physicians have fallen victims to the bicycle craze, the profession is not backward in pointing out some of the injurious effects of too much riding or constant use of the wheel. "Since the machine has become popular here," remarked a physician whose name is among machine has become popular here," remarked a physician whose name is among the popular lecturers at medical colleges, the other day, "more cases of spinal trouble have come to the notice of the profession than ever before, and not a few of these are of a peculiar nature, that, no doubt, are due to the position acquired by the victims while on the wheel. Then there is at present a greater n mber of persons troubled with 'pigeon toes' and the 'bicycle walk' than there were a few years ago." In explaining these new physical deformities which the extreme use of the bicycle is rapidly producing, the learned M.D. continued:

The constant revolving motion of the feet deformities which the extreme use of the blcycle is rapidly producing, the learned M.D. continued:

The constant revolving motion of the feet and lower legs as they turn the pedals has given to the gait of those people who are much addicted to the blcycle a peculiar turn, which is known as the blcycle walk. Those who remember the days of the roller-skating craze, will probably recall the effect that exercise had on the gait of those who practiced it, particularly the gait of some of the young ladies of the age, to be easily affected. They took on at once a rolling, swinging, half-gliding, rhythmical step, that resembled the motion of roller-skating as closely as could be by any one not on rollers. So it will be with the bicycle walk, except that instead of being only a temporary peculiarity, it threatens to become permanent.

The blcycling walk is nothing more or less than the pedaling motion of the wheel applied to the walk, but it gives to a person who has it a decidedly peculiar appearance. Notice a cyclist who is afflicted. It will be seen that when he lifts his back foot in walking he does not put it straight ahead, but carries it back a little, as he would have to in following the pedals, and then swings it high, almost up to the calf of the other leg, before sending it forward. The pigeon-toeing comes in there, also, and causes the sufferer from the bicycle walk to interfere, after the manner of horses. The interference comes higher up, though, because of the upward swing of the foot as it goes forward.

The pigeon-toeing is accounted for by the position of the feet on the pedals. There the toes turn in and down, and the heels turn up and out, the pressure being borne on the ball of the foot.

Among the racing men the "bicycle walk" is most noticeable, of course. It has taken them in much worse form than it has the ordinary cyclist, and extendes to the swing of the arms and carriage of the head. The elbows of a racing man bend out from the body, as a result of having to bear his weight as he leans far ov
