THE REGINA DISASTER.

Fred Hindson Among Those Killed.
James Hindson Injured.

The terrible death-dealing cyclone at Regina Sunday afternoon that plunged not only the West but all of Canada into mourning, is one of the worst disasters that has ever befallen this fair country. The identified dead number 30, missing 22, besides hundreds of injured and a property loss estimated between five and ten million dollars.

Seven blocks of the finest residential street in the city are devastated, and some of the most valuable and substantial business blocks are razed—all in the space of a few minutes, without a moment's warning.

There is scarcely a section in Ontario that does not claim at least one of the dead, injured or property losers as a former resident. Here in Watford, Fred Hindson, son of our former townspeople, Mr. and Mrs. James Hindson, is among the dead, and his father badly injured. Fred Hindson was born in Watford, and is a grandson of Mrs. Hastings', Front street. He, with his father, James Hindson, and three others were taken from their home on Lorrie street. Harvey Gardner, one of the first to attempt the rescue work there, said: "The houses collapsed along the street. I knew some were in Hindson's. I ran over to assist, but it was slow work alone. I could hear the groans of those under the wreckage. Every move we made caused a shout or a groan, and it was with sinking hearts we kept on. At last Fred was taken out dead, evidently hit by something. His chum, Bob Edgar, was a few feet from Fred, upstairs, but he wiggled out unhurt. The father, James Hindson, was taken out badly hurt, his collar bone being broken, and two others slightly. Next door we took out four more or less injured." The many friends of the family in Watford and vicinity extend sympathy to the bereaved ones and also to all others who have suffered by the appalling disaster.

Rev. E. B. Horne's Call to Renfrew.

From the Renfrew Mercury of last week we glean that the congregational meeting of the members of St. Andrew's church to consider the giving of a call to a minister, as a successor to the Rev. John Hay, was held in the church on Friday evening. The proceedings were under the direction of Rev. W. J. Knox, of Pembroke, interim moderator of session. Six clergymen who had preached before the congregation were balloted for. On the first ballot all of the six who have preached received some votes, but Rev. E. B. Horne, M. A., had double the vote of the next highest. The two lowest were dropped, and another ballot taken. Again Rev. Mr. Horne had double the next highest. The last ballot was between these two and for the third time Mr. Horne led by double. Later, two of those who had voted for the other favorite moved and seconded that the call to Rev. Mr. Horne be made unanimous; and this at once carried. Rev. Mr. Knox said that he heartily congratulated the congregation on the choice they had made. As moderator he had kept himself absolutely impartial, but now he felt free to say that he had known Mr. Horne for some years. Mr. Horne would do the congregation credit wherever he was; in the pulpit of the church, in the meetings of the presbytery or on the floor of the General Assembly. The call, as provided by a vote which had been taken previously, promises a stipend of \$1,800 a year, free manse and a month's holiday. It will be forwarded in due course to the presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew and also to that in which Watford is situated. If Mr. Horne accepts the call it will be a matter of nearly two months before all the proceedings will have been completed to permit of his induction to the ministry here.

Rev. Mr. Horne is a native of western Ontario and is a man in the early fifties. He was educated in Galt Collegiate Institute and Toronto University; and in theology in Knox College. In Toronto University he took an exceptionally strong course in political economy and bore an active part in university student life. About a year after graduation he was dean of Knox College for a year or two. He then received a call to the Presbyterian church at Watford, where he has been for eleven or twelve years and where he has built up a good congregation. He made a strong impression on the congregation here as a good preacher, and we learn is possessed of strong debating power. On the floor of the church courts he holds his position strongly, yet is exceedingly tolerant. He seems in all respects well worthy to minister to a congregation which in the past has been looked upon as one of the best in the Presbytery of Lanark and Renfrew, which in turn is looked upon as one of the best working Presbyteries in the church. No congregation, no matter how good the supply may be, but suffers somewhat from having no settled minister in charge; and a great opportunity for service now opens before Rev. Mr. Horne if he accepts the call of St. Andrew's.
