As a consequence the commission found conditions of desolation, utter wretchedness and social and moral disintegration which defied full portraval. atrocities were being committed, equal in horror to those charged in former years upon the Turks began to be bandied about among the combatants and quondam allies. Of these the complaints were loudest and most insistent from the Greeks, and their detailed character was one of the reasons why European opinion leaned so heavily against Bulgaria. At the close of the war a general determination to arrive at the truth led to the appointment, at the instance of the Carnegie Peace Foundation, of a representative commission, to whom was entrusted the auty of investigating the circumstances and establishing the responsibility for the outrages if they were cannot last.
