Toronto, March 7.—Receipts at the Union stockyards to-day were 932 cattle, 82 calves, 693 hogs and 59 sheep and lambs.

The big storm of last night was in part responsible for a firm, strong market for cattle to-day, with prices in some cases probably 10c higher than yesterday. A number of belated cars, which had been held up by the storm, arrived too late for the early market and were in consequence held over for to-morrow's market. Trade was lively and good for the cattle offered and prices were firm and slightly higher.

Hogs were in keen demand, with a light run in, and prices were advanced 25c over yesterday's quotations.
