## Abbe Mourned As Murdered Fled For Love.

Requiem Celebrated for Ropes of Soul of Delarue, Alive in Brussels

Paris, Oct. 8.—After the authorities had decided that he had been murdered and the clergy had celebrated a requiem mass for the repose of his soul, the Abbe Delarue of Chateaux, who disappeared several weeks ago, has been found alive in Brussels. With him was a young woman named Fremont, a school teacher, who left that place about two weeks ago.

The disappearance of the abbe was one of the sensations of the year. The most careful and thorough search was made, the aid of a Hindoo sorcerer being enlisted. The authorities even secured a hyena, in the belief that if the abbe had been murdered and his body left in the woods, the hyena would find it even if it had been buried.

For days and weeks the search continued, but without avail. Then his parishioners, by whom he was much loved, sadly decided that he had been murdered. Mass was celebrated and the whole parish mourned him sincerely.

Now it develops that almost at the very hour that his parishioners were praying for him, while the church bells tolled and the edifice was draped in black, the Abbe Delarue was making his identity known to the authority at Brussels and recounting the story of his flight.

"For three years," the abbe said, "I have loved Mlle. Fremont and she has returned my affection. The day on which I was obliged to play was a tortuous one to both. I could no longer bear to face my parishioners, whom, God knows, I loved tenderly. I had educated Mlle. Fremont when she was left an orphan in my parish, and it was through my influence that she got the post of village school teacher. One day I discovered that my sentiments for her were not in accordance with my duties as a priest. From that moment I decided to quit my office and to take the way out of the difficulty by leaving the priesthood and taking to me the laymen of the world."

It seemed no possible way of escape in the matter between us. I disappeared, and as soon as the excitement over my disappearance began to subside the police came to me. They ostensibly went on a visit to my sisters and a couple of intimates to whom she had decided not to return to Chateaux, but had accepted a post as governess in a family which was about to leave for Germany. She was, however, careful to give no names, and not to indicate for what part of the country she was leaving. She joined me at the spot agreed upon, and together we came to Brussels. We shall be married as soon as possible.

"The day following my departure from Chateaux I spent in Paris. I returned the next day and went to Etampes where I dined with a friend, who it will be remembered, told how she had seen me. On leaving her I rode back toward Chateaux and left my bicycle in the woods, where it was found by the Hindoo sorcerer. Then I walked across country and took the train again for Paris at a little wayside station. When I got to that city I discarded my priestly robes and donned civilian attire."
