In one of them averaging an attendance of about thirty, no fewer tunn seven had made a prefession of the Christian faith. The meeting was brought to a close by a brief address from Prin. MacVioux who called attention to the aid rendered to the cause of religious instruction by the Preternat Public Schools of the city, in which the Bible is both read and studied systematically under the guidance of teachers who were almost without exception heartily in sympathy with such instruction.
