Bethune of Cobourg, and Alexander of Port Hope, vested in surplice, hood, and scarf, left the Incumbent's residence, and walked to the Church, where a special service prepared for the occasion, and sanctioned by the Lord Bishop of Toronto, was conducted as follows:

The Incumbent said the Morning Prayer, Mr. C. Bethune read the first Lesson, Mr. Alexander the second Lesson, and the Bishop elect commenced the Ante-Communion service. Mr. Wilson was the Epistoller, and Mr. Beck the Gospeller. The Bishop elect then delivered an admirable and appropriate discourse from Ezekiel xliii. 12; after which Mr. Beck read the Offertory, &c., the Bishop elect concluding with a Collect and the Blessing.

Mrs. Leigh kindly presided at the Melodeon and displayed her accustomed good taste, and the Choir rendered the chants and hymns, the latter consisting of "Christ is made the sure Foundation," &c., and "Jerusalem the golden!" &c., with more than their usual force and precision.

The congregation was large, and the collection in aid of the building Fund,

amounted to the sum of \$63.
