2. Moreover, Administrations are authorized to make with one another any necessary agreements on the subject of questions which do not concern the Union generally, provided that conditions less favourable than those laid down by the Acts of the Union are not introduced. In the letter post, for example, they may conclude mutual arrangements for the adoption of lower Pates of postage within a zone on either side of their frontiers.

ARTICLE 6

Internal Laws

The provisions of the Convention and of the Agreements of the Union do override the legislation of any country as regards anything which is not pressly covered by these Acts.

ARTICLE 7

Exceptional Relations

Administrations which provide a service with certain territories not inadministrations which provide a service with ded in the Union will be required to be the intermediaries of the other dministrations. The provisions of the Convention and its Detailed Regulaapply to these exceptional relations.
