Mr. Speaker, some Members of the Opposition are inferring that they are steadfast defenders of our social programs. I think they have a bad case of selective amnesia. Although they may not want to hear it, I may remind them it was the previous Government that fully de-indexed family allowances for 1976, when Canada was faced with an annual inflation rate of 11.2 per cent.

In 1983-84, the previous Government again acted by capping increases in family allowance payments at 6 and 5 per cent respectively. I suggest that our friends opposite stop their posturing.

One of the Ministers at the time stated that it was impossible to deal effectively with our own deficit and that of the provinces unless taxpayers helped to reduce these deficits by limiting their income. Those words should be an inspiration to the Opposition today.

In concluding, Mr. Speaker, I would like to stress that the two Opposition parties do not have a monopoly on compassion. Our Government's family assistance policies are dictated by the principles of social justice. The principle of universality is not being challenged. In addition, the whole family assistance program is more progressive than it was under the previous administration. Finally, our fight against the deficit sparked

the economic recovery which makes it possible for all Canadians to look forward to better days.

Mr. Speaker, I fervently hope that Bill C-70 will be referred to a legislative committee as soon as possible.
