

say, the principal, four hundred pounds; head teacher, English, two hundred pounds; French, three hundred pounds; instrumental music, two hundred pounds; vocal, one hundred and fifty pounds; housekeeper, one hundred pounds, all currency.

The salary of the head teacher of English to be increased as soon as the number of paying pupils in the Institute shall justify the Governors in so doing.

The Governesses to receive a small salary with educational advantages.

The head teacher of English shall be expected to assist the Principal and act for her in her absence, and she shall be called Vice-Principal of the Institute.

The salary of the Principal also to be raised under like circumstances should the Governors deem it advisable to allow her any educational duty, but at no time shall it exceed five hundred pounds currency.

The salaries of the governesses, inferior officers and servants of the Institute to be fixed by the governors.

All the teachers to be unmarried ladies or widows, and have their home at the Institute over and above their salaries.

All officials and servants to receive board free of expense. Should any addition for staff teachers be required, or household servants, it shall be the duty of the governors to make such additions as circumstances of the state of the Institute may require.

Teachers and all officers to be paid quarterly.

In engaging teachers, and all connected with the Institute, the governors shall be required to exercise prudence and consideration for the special benefit of the Institute.

The allowance to governors in Montreal shall be to each, during the time of their holding office (which shall not exceed five years), two pounds ten shillings currency for each meeting which they themselves respectively attend. Those coming from a distance to be allowed travelling and lodging expenses in addition.

The governors, either as a body or by committee, shall consult frequently as to the literary government of the Institution, and shall be required, at all times, when necessary, to visit and aid the teachers in the discharge of duty, and deliver, or cause to be delivered, as often as they may judge it for the benefit of the
