

BERLIN, June 17 .- (Can. Press.) Emperor William's silver jubilee, which has filled the Berlin streets with the greatest, gayest crowd of celebrants ever seen in the capital, reached its climax today with visits from the allied sovereigns and closed with a gala dinner this evening followed by a

picturesque torchlight process ion of students. The empress, altho somewhat taxed by the continuous festivities, beginning with Princess Victoria Luise's marirage, was nevertheless present The King of Saxony proposed a toast to the emperor, who replied with graceful acknowledgment of the loyal aid that has always been granted him

Capel Court Had a Hunch That Things Were Not O. K.—

LONDON, June 17.—The stock market was depressed today. 


