C.P.R. HAVE FILED PLANS FOR LINE THRU RIVERDALE

Runs Diagonally From Foot of Leslie Street Thru to Don River Above Jail.

The C.P.R. have filed plans at the registry office for a new entrance to the city from the east. A belief obtains, however, in many quarters that it is merely a ploy intended to split public sentiment and secure as a compromise route that will be acceptable to the C.P.R.

On the plans filed is shown a main line that begins at a point south of the Woodbine track, and extending westerly just south of the north limit of the city property being filled in along Ashbridge's Bay, and following the north side of the river, and runs northwesterly in a diagonal direction, crossing Eastern-avenue just west of Whitford-street, Elizabeth-street, just south of Queen, and Queen just west of Pape-avenue, then runs up between Pape and Pape-avenues, crossing the G.T.R. at Gerrard, then northwesterly between Logan and Carlaw-avenues, crossing the former at Withrow, then turning almost west, crossing Bain-street, Sparkhall-avenue, and Broadview just north of the latter.

The line is then shown as cutting across the middle of Riverdale Park and joining the main line to the north at Withrow, then turning almost north, as striking north from the waterfront line just south of the cattle yards, and following the east bank of the Don until it joins the present main line near Riverdale.

The line as can be judged the plan of the railway is an east-bound freight up the branch turning north from Leslie-street, and all the rest of the Don.

It is stated that the Canadian Northern has changed its plans, and will apply for a route to run north from the Kingston, through Queen-street west of the Woodbine-overhead and thence extending through Ashbridge's bay.

Corporation Council Fullerton, City Engineer Rust and Controller Harrison left last night for Ottawa to approve the railway commission and urge delay in consideration of the Grand Trunk plans for an eastern extension to Toronto.

A despatch from Ottawa says the railway is fully prepared to push its application to-day before the commission, and will vigorously fight against any interference with its plans.

Andrew F. Macallum, the engineer in charge of the Transcontinental Railway through southern Ontario, has been engaged by the city to take charge of the surveys in connection with the eastern entrance of the railroads.

F. S. SPENCE HAS RESIGNED HAS BROKEN DOWN IN HEALTH

Secretary of the Ontario Alliance Will Retire After 23 Years of Earnest Service.

The resignation of F. S. Spence as secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance was accepted by the executive board yesterday, with considerable regret. It takes effect at once. In the interim between now and the annual meeting (Feb. 21 and 22) the secretary of the alliance, Rev. Ben. H. Spence, has been appointed to act as secretary. A permanent successor to Mr. Spence will be appointed at the annual meeting. The executive board has no one definitely in view for the position, although at present it is rumored that B. H. Spence and Dr. S. D. Chown are considered the most capable men in the city.

Mr. Spence's resignation, as read by President G. F. Marter, is as follows: "In view of the need for a change in my health and personal affairs, I am obliged to resign from the position of secretary of the Ontario branch of the Dominion Alliance."

"This decision has not been made without much feeling of regret at relinquishing the privilege of taking so large a part in the working out of plans for the advancement of the temperance cause, as must always be the case with the secretary of the alliance. As you are aware, the work that I have been doing has at times made very severe demands upon my regular time and energy, but it has always been a pleasure, because of the success attending it, and because of the kindness, consideration and earnest co-operation of yourself and the other members of the executive and friends of the cause."

"That association and co-operation have been most gratifying and enjoyable. I look forward to the pleasure of still continuing to work with you and the Alliance, against the drink evil, although not able to take as intimate and continuous a part as before. I have no doubt that the wise and progressive principles and methods that have been followed for many years done by their secretary during the 23 years of his service. In the time he has been connected in the province have been reduced to less than half of the number existing when he began the work, despite the heavy loss in population. In Toronto alone, with a population four times what it was 23 years ago, the licenses have shrunk to less than half of about 800 in the city and municipalities, there are about 300 without licenses of any kind."

Mr. Spence made the following statement last night regarding his resignation: "I have been working very hard for comparatively small remuneration. I have been doing so for many years, and I have no doubt that the love of the cause, until my health has become seriously impaired. Now I intend going away for a long rest, probably to the old country. I hope to be away for a good long holiday. When I come back I will look about for some field of activity in Toronto."

HE DEFEATED "JOHN A." Death of Alex. Gunn, Former M.P. for Kingston.

Kingston, Jan. 15.—Alexander Gunn, postmaster, and former federal member for Kingston, died to-day from pneumonia, aged 78 years. He was born in Scotland, and was a member of the mercantile company of Gunn & Co., which controlled the business of Eastern and Middle Ontario.

In 1878 he defeated Sir John A. Macdonald and held the seat till 1887. He was the first Liberal Kingston ever elected.

In 1897 he was appointed postmaster.

SUPPORTS NEW ROUTE. Robert Reford Says Blackstock Proposition is in General Interest.

Montreal, Jan. 15.—Robert Reford, one of the best informed steamship men in Canada, comes out strongly in favor of the Blackstock Ireland to Halifax fast line proposition, as being a commercial and otherwise feasible and highly desirable in the interests of Canada.

McGILL'S WORK AS EXECUTOR IS UNDERGOING A SCRUTINY Ontario Government Commission's Lawyer to Make an Investigation into Certain Rumors.

A lawyer, under instructions from the government, is looking into the administration of the estate of the late Mrs. Nicholas of Peterboro. The estate was worth about \$1,000,000, and was largely bequeathed to charities and works of public benefit. One of the executors was Charles McGill, the ex-manager of the Ontario Bank, and it appears that allegations have gained currency that the beneficiaries have not been distributed with that promptness which might have been expected in the public interest. It is stated that at least one-half of the estate is still unaccounted for, and the complaints reached such proportions that the government deemed it wise to take some action.

The department is exceedingly reticent in the matter, but a report will shortly be forthcoming.

IN THE POLICE COURT. Frank Arnold, K.C., counsel for G. R. B. Cockburn, who is making strenuous efforts to make the case against his client, in police court, closed at once. Crown Attorney Corley is opposing this movement. Mr. Corley, who is ill with grip, was in court yesterday morning. He told Magistrate Denison that some important evidence to introduce, but he could not possibly do it for some days. It is understood that Hon. A. B. Morine, who is to examine the case against the ex-president, will be the civil suit instituted by the Bankers' Association, expects to secure admissions which will help the case against the ex-president. The principal witness yesterday was G. W. Yarker, manager of the Toronto Clearing House. In a conversation with Cockburn some time ago, he mentioned to him that it was street talk that McGill was known to be dealing in stocks. Cockburn subsequently told witness he had spoken to McGill about it. McGill made the excuse that he was executor for a large estate in Peterboro and found it necessary to change securities from time to time. Continuing, Mr. Yarker testified that McGill was not in the office for a bank to have a "ticker" in the office. The presence of the "tapper" there would not necessarily indicate jail.

Madrid, Jan. 15.—The police have discovered an anarchist plot, in which several persons participated, to kill several prominent persons Jan. 21, the day fixed for the opening of the parliamentary debate on the attempt on the lives of King Alfonso and Queen Victoria, the day of their marriage, May 31 last.

HOWARTH GETS 30 DAYS. In police court John Mundy was fined \$5 for making a nuisance of himself. Alfred Howarth, for trying the get-rich-quick plan of making money by inducing applicants for situations to send him 50 cents, will do 30 days in jail.

FIVE ALL WITH SMALLPOX DISEASE OF MILD TYPE

Brook Ave. Family Removed to Hospital - Others in Neighborhood May Be Affected.

After weeks of freedom from smallpox, the disease has again broken out, and five members of a Brook-avenue household were yesterday afternoon taken to the Swiss Cottage Hospital, suffering from an attack.

"The smallpox is of the mildest type and there is absolutely nothing serious in the situation," declared Dr. Sheard last night. He is not sure that the contagion may not have spread in the locality to some extent, and that there may not be some fresh cases on their hands within the next few days, but in view of the mildness of the form, he is not alarmed.

Three of the patients are adults and about 16, and a niece about 12, whose parents are tenants of the house. The family physician reported the symptoms to Dr. Sheard yesterday morning. He visited the house at noon and investigation confirmed the report. The sufferers were then removed to the hospital in an ambulance.

The source of the infection has been traced to a visitor from Manitoba, who made a stay during the holiday season. He was then unwell and his symptoms, as described, satisfied Dr. Sheard that he was in the early stages of a smallpox attack.
